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STATE WATER CONSERVATION COMMISSION MINUTES OF MEETING Held in Office of State Water Commission Bismarck, North Dakota January 7, 1960

A regular meeting of the North Dakota State Water commission was called to order on January 7, 1960, in the office of the commission, State Capitol Building, to consider routine business matters. The following members were present;

MEMBERS OF STATE WATER COMMISSION:

The meeting was called to order by acting chairman Commissioner Lunseth at 9:45 a.m. with Commissioners Einar Dahl, Math Dahl, A. R. Weinhandl and Secretary Hoisveen Present.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES It was moved by Commissioner Math Dahl and seconded by Commissioner Einar Dahl that the minutes of the November 20, 1959 meeting be approved and filed in the office of the State Water Commission. All members voted aye and the motion was carried.

be approved. All members voted aye and the motion was carried.

ORGANIZATION OF SHEYENNESecretary Hoisveen reported on the meetings heldRIVER WATER CONSERVATIONin an effort to create a water conservation and& FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICTflood control district on the Sheyenne River,DENIEDSouth West Fargo area - from Richland Countyline to the confluence with the Red River of the

North. The effort to organize the district was stimulated by West Fargo. This city, as well as outlying areas, has been confronted with past flood problems. This situation has been accentuated through the construction of Interstate Highway # 94. Two meetings were held, one at Horace at 2 p.m. on January 4, 1960 and the other at West Fargo at 4 p.m. Commissioner Corwin was along and participated in the meeting. At Horace there were about 36 persons in attendance. The vote was 10 to 5 in favor of creating a district but when the meeting was held in West Fargo apparently the opposition was there and opposed the work that would be done in the lower portion of the river. The vote was 14 to 10 against creating such a district. Neither the Mayor nor several of the councilmen attended the meeting. Proponents of the District had expressed much support for the

district prior to the hearing. Their support at the hearing was not as adamant as that of the opponents. Commissioner William Corwin, who participated in the hearing, did not believe the support shown at the meeting would justify its establishment. Mr. Hoisveen likewise recommended that the petition to create a water conservation and flood control district be denied until more interest is shown.

Mr. Hoisveen stated that such a district would be very helpful in reducing the flooding as it would provide for a levee system south of West Fargo on the Sheyenne River. A considerable quantity of water leaves the Sheyenne River and floods adjacent properties during flood stage. Future consideration of a district should exclude townships who will not receive direct benefits. Mr. Hoisveen read a telegram from the officers of Reed Township and Harwood Township requesting that they not be included if a water conservation and flood control district is formed.

The City of Cavalier requested financial part-REQUEST FOR FINANCIAL icipation on the part of the State Water Com-PARTICIPATION IN M-4 mission on M-4 Dam on the Tongue River, which DAM ON TONGUE RIVER is presently being improved through the use of a watershed project. This dam would provide 1100 acre feet of water for use by the City of Cavalier at an estimated cost of \$24,000. The allocation for municipal water will not be made unless the city or some other source raises the money. The Soil Conservation Service suggested that the State Water Conservation Commission be solicited and put in a portion of this money. The amount required from the State Water Commission would be \$10,000. The City is also requesting \$10,000 from the Game and Fish Department. The City of Cavalier would raise the remaining \$4,000. The philosophy is contrary to State Water Conservation Commission policy and statements previously made on watersheds. On the basis of that policy Secretary Hoisveen stated that he denied them participation on the part of the Commission. They were told why the Commission could not enter into such participation. The Commission was required to maintain two maintenance crews to perform dam maintenance. If we allocated all our money to construction being performed by the Federal Government it would render our own crews impotent and we would be unable to provide emergency repair work. The City of Cavalier was, however, given to understand that it was extremely important for them to obligate this water for future use. The City of Cavalier is now applying for a water right.

Commissioner Math Dahl moved that the Commission approve the action of the State Engineer in turning down the request of the City of Cavalier. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Einar Dahl. All Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

REQUEST FOR PARTICIPATION Mr. Lee Pratt, consulting engineer, requested IN BRIDGE CONNECTION WITH participation on the part of the Commission for MAPLE RIVER WATERSHED the construction of a bridge in connection with PROJECT the Maple River Watershed Project. This request was based on the fact that the Commission had contributed to the construction of a bridge in the Mandan area. Attention was called to the fact that Mr. Bradley had been misinformed on the Commission's contribution on the Mandan Project. While the Commission contributed to the project, the statement was

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so worded that the contribution was not for the bridge. Mr. Bradley informed the officers of the Maple River Watershed Project that the Commission had contributed to the bridge construction. As a result, they thought the Commission should contribute to the Maple River Watershed Project. Secretary Hoisveen read the following statement regarding the Commission's contribution to the Mandan Project: "The State Water Conservation Commission, the Highway Department, and the Board of Administration are participating in the cost of certain features of the flood protective project for the City of Mandan, the State Training School, and adjacent properties. The Water Commission's participation is limited to the purchase of rights of way, internal drainage, and the raising and reinforcement of levees protecting the City and the State Training School. The Commission at a meeting held on June 12, 1958 agreed to participate to the extent of \$40,000.00 through its Multiple Purpose Fund. This agreement was reaffirmed by Commission action at a meeting held on August 7, 1958." It was moved by Commissioner Weinhandl and seconded by Commissioner Math Dahl that the Commission do not participate in the bridge connection with the Maple River Watershed Project. All Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

MEMBERSHIP DUES CONGRESS

The Commission's membership fee in the Rivers and Harbors Congress is due. It was moved by Commisioner Math Dahl and seconded by Commissioner Weinhandl that the Commission approve the payment of the membership dues in the Rivers and Harbors Congress. On Roll Call Vote, all Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

GENERAL BARNEY'S LETTER **RE: RESERVOIR REGULA -**TION IN REGARD TO BANK EROSION

Secretary Hoisveen stated that a reply had been received from General Barney regarding back erosion indicating they will operate the Garrison reservoir releases the same as they have been doing. We will continue to show opposition to

this erosion. Mr. Weinhandl stated that the bank erosion was getting quite serious and he thought it should be brought to the attention of the Missouri Basin Inter-agency Committee when the meeting is held in April. He stated that it was brought to the attention of the Committee at Atchison and they were surprised that so much land was being eroded. Mr. Weinhandl felt that something should be done to protect the bank, as when more water is backed up it will be worse. Secretary Hoisveen stated that Mr. Fredrickson and he planned to go over this situation with the Corps of Engineers in Washington, D. C. later this month. Mr. Fredrickson has made arrangements for such a meeting.

LETTER FROM SENATOR BRUNSDALE

A letter was read from Senator Brunsdale thanking the Commission for its good wishes on his appointment as U. S. Senator.

PETITION - DRAIN 45 WEST FARGO

A petition was received from a group of farmers relative to Drain 45 which now passes through at West Fargo. Technical assistance has been

given to the drain district on some phases of this project. The Highway Department has put in two large 48" culverts, under interstate #94. This was done at the recommendation of a local farmer. The flood water could have been diverted into the Sheyenne River. The drain has been evaluated by the Commission staff. Recommendations have been made and the project

will be charged to the Highway Department. A spillway and dike will be installed at a specified elevation which will permit the water from both the north and south ditches to be diverted into the Sheyenne River and excess flow will pass over the spillway and be conveyed through Drain 45 where it will be picked up by the West Fargo pumping station and pumped into the Sheyenne River. No action is required on the part of the Commission members. The Commission staff will offer its technical assistance.

The Governor presided at the remainder of the

MC VILLE DAM PARTICIPATION Secretary Hoisveen reported that a plan had been worked out to use State Highway 15 in connection with the construction of a dam

near the city of McVille. The details have all been worked out but the Commission has not approved the expenditure of the funds. The State Game and Fish Department will participate on a one-third basis, the city of McVille on a one-third basis and the Commission one-third. The total expenditure would be about \$36,125. The Commission's share would be \$12,050. This would be done as a cooperative job. The Commission would be required to do the riprap. It was moved by Commissioner Math Dahl and seconded by Commissioner Lunseth that the Commission members approve the expenditure to participate in the McVille Dam on a one-third basis, not to exceed \$12,050. One Roll Call Vote, all Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

LOWER YELLOWSTONEThe Water Commission in 1939 participated in theIRRIGATION DISTRICTintake to the Lower Yellowstone in cooperationRE: INTEREST ON LOANwith Montana Water Board. In view of the fact
that a pump intake was located in Montana they

were going to take the water into North Dakota. Commissioner Einar Dahl Stated that this was a WPA project and they expected to extend it into North Dakota but appropriation was used up in Montana and they did not get into North Dakota. There is a balance of five or six hundred dollars, less interest still due to the Commission. The principal cannot be cancelled, it has to be paid. The district is now planning on going together with the Cartwright District and organize together. This indebtedness has to be paid before the new district is organized. If the interest could be cancelled, which it can according to the Attorney General, the district could be organized. The amount due with the interest is \$1700.

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Bank of North Dakota had the bonds. The Commission, through bonded funds, is the one actually carrying the bonds. Actually, as far as the bonds are concerned, any money collected goes into the general fund. If the interest were cancelled the indebtedness would be a little over \$500.

Governor Davis stated that the idea of going back and applying the interest on the principal does not look to well.

The interest from now on could probably be cancelled but not the interest that has already been paid and applied as interest.

Commissioner Math Dahl stated that an appropriation of \$100,000 was set up and he thought there was about \$80,000 still in that fund. It was suggested by Commission members that a statement of the amounts paid on principal and interest be made available to the Commission members at their next meeting showing how the payments were applied. It was also suggested that the payments made by the district be checked into to see how the interest and principal payments were made. A further suggestion was made that the Montana situation be explored by the Secretary. These reports were to be prepared for the next meeting.

SIOUX IRRIGATION DISTRICTSecretary Hoisveen reported that in accordanceRE: PILOT WELLwith previous authorization, several drill holes
were put down in the Sioux Irrigation project in

anticipation of obtaining a ground water supply for that project. At the present time they obtain their supply of water from the Yellowstone River above the project. The water is conveyed to the project and then into the laterals where it is delivered to the farm units and used for irrigation projects. The Commission financed the project. They are paying this back at the rate of \$1000 per year. Difficulties have been encountered at the pump intake because of the quantity of water being used upstream. This has resulted in low flow which does not permit the removal of sufficient water to carry on sustained irrigation during these periods. The Commission crew drilled a series of holes and found that there is a very fine quantity and quality of water in this area. This bed rock has been found near the buttes. The Commission should consider putting in a pilot well which would cost between \$2,500 and \$3,000. Should the well be developed to a satisfactory degree it could be sold to the district. The estimated cost of lowering the intake is \$15,900. It is quite possible that as a result of what the Commission might do in this area they would eventually go to ground water as a source of supply for the irrigation district. The present intake is in a precarious situation in view of the fact that the river has cut back to the intake and the district has had to pipe quite a section of ditch through the use of 30" pipe. Some time in the future it will be necessary for the district to relocate the pump intake or go to ground water. The depth of the aquifer is 50 feet.

It was suggested that the district enter into an agreement with the Commission to repay the Commission for the well but the agreement would not exceed 5 years. The appropriation of funds is to be passed on later by the Commission when the district has been contacted.

It was moved by Commissioner Lunseth and seconded by Commissioner Weinhandl that the Secretary be authorized to enter into an agreement on behalf of the Commission that if the well proves satisfactory the district will repay the Commission what it has expended on the well and that amount be repaid within a 5 year period. All Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

BORINGS AND SURVEY -Nine feet of clay was found over a tremendouslyKELLY SLOUGH DAMlarge aquifer in the Kelly Slough area west ofSITEGrand Forks where Kelly Lake Dam is being Contemplated.

A flowing artesian well was found. It was flowing at the rate of 110 gallons per minute. It took three days of effort on the part of our crew before the well could be stopped. It is a poor quality of water. Much interest is being manifested in the project which would be supplied with water from Hazen Brook, a fresh water stream which would be diverted into Kelly Slough.

The Game and Fish would not be able to participate until the next appropriation is due. The engineering work would be completed and would be made available to the local people in the near future. Commissioner Lunseth said that they have organized a group in Grand Forks called the Kelly Lake Improvement Association. It was moved by Commissioner Weinhandl and seconded by Commissioner Math Dahl that the Commission, as a result of the survey, determine the cost and make the feasibility of the project known to the local proponents. All Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

BORINGS AND SURVEY -Borings of a foundation nature have been completed BOWBELL'S DAM SITE on the Stoney Creek Dam in Burke County. This project is being sponsored by the Burke County Water Conservation and Flood Control District, as well as the City of Bowbells. It will be used for recreation and a potential municipal water supply. COMMISSION MEETING FEBRUARY 4, 1960 Secretary Hoisveen stated that on February 4, 1960 an appreciation dinner was planned for Bruce Johnson and he suggested that the com-

mission hold its next meeting on that date. Commissioner Weinhandl stated that he would be unable to be present. All other commissioners agreed to hold the meeting on February 4, 1960.

DAM - LOWER APPLE It was reported that a reasonably priced dam CREEK could be constructed in the lower reaches of Apple Creek on a 50-50 basis. The benefit would be to back water up down below Falkners. The dam would be right off the new Catholic School. The water runs off below and when the stream dries up the people want everyone to open up the dams up above. These people are after the Commission to do something. The dam would cost around \$6,000 to \$10,000. It may not be a permanent dam but would do the job for a number of years. It was suggested that the County Commissioners be contacted to see how much they would contribute before any action is taken by the Commission.

WATER RIGHT LEGISLA -TION - HR 5555

This bill, HR 5555, would put the administration of water rights in the hands of the states. The various organizations have been attempting for

years to interest the people in the eastern part of the United States in water rights. They have now become interested in the Farm Bureau bill. It is a states right bill and would give the state jurisdiction over all water with the exception of navigation servitude.

PEMBINA COUNTY DRAINS #4 and #18

Request for these drains, #4 and #18, was received in August 1959. The State Water Commission at its August meeting moved not to participate since these drains should be a part of the Tongue River project. Mr. Nelson and Secretary Hoisveen met with the Pembina Drain Board. They stated the Soil Conservation Commission wanted to route it in a different direction and the drain board could not agree with them as the area served did not correspond with their desires. The area would be best served by the two drains, #4 which flows into 18 and Rosebud Coulee. The estimated cost of construction is \$45,424. The Commission would be required to pay 40% or \$18,169. It is to be stipulated that the Commission would not participate in the rights of way. It was moved by Commissioner Math Dahl and seconded by Commissioner Lunseth that the Commission approve participation in drains #4 and #18 not to exceed \$18,169 for drainage construction purposes only and not to include rights of way. One Roll Call Vote all Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

PEMBINA COUNTY DRAIN #7

Request was received from the drain board in September 1959 asking the Commission's participation in this drain. The Commission's share in this drain would be \$11,390.52. The Commission would have no responsibility as to maintenance work on this drain. It was moved by Commissioner Lunseth and seconded by Commissioner Weinhandl that the Commission participate in Pembina County Drain #7, not to exceed \$11,200. On Roll Call Vote Commission members all voted aye and the motion was carried.

WATER RIGHTS

802

Bernard Bourrette of Zahl, North Dakota requested the right to divert 615 acre feet of water from rats Coulee, Tributary of the Little Muddy River, to irrigate 262.2 acres of land. Commissioner Math Dahl moved that Mr. Bourrette be granted 262 acre feet of water for irrigation purposes. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Einar Dahl. All Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

813 Charles Bublitz of Ambrose requests the right to divert 94 acre feet of water from Unnamed Creek, a tributary of Long Creek, to irrigate 47 acres. Secretary Hoisveen stated that this Creek was in the hands of the Internation Joint Commission and suggested that action be deferred until there is more clarification on the International Joint Commission.

815 Carl M. and Fred C. Eidmann of Towner, North Dakota request the right to divert 200 acre feet of water from a well to irrigate 100 acres of land. It was moved by Commissioner Math Dahl and seconded by Commissioner Einar Dahl that Messrs. Eidmann be granted

the right to divert 150 acre feet of water from a well. All Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.

The Village of Lignite has requested the right to divert 480 acre feet of water from wells for municipal and industrial use. It was moved by Commissioner Math Dahl and seconded by Commissioner Einar Dahl that the City of Lignite be granted

the right to divert 480 acre feet of water from wells for municipal and industrial use. All Commissioners voted aye and the motion was carried.
