Governor William L. Guy called the meeting to

APPROVAL OF MINUTES It was moved by Commissioner Corwin that the minutes be approved as distributed. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Math Dahl, and carried.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR DECEMBER 1962

Secretary Hoisveen discussed the State Water Commission's appropriation for the remainder of the biennium. The multiple purpose fund was

discussed. Jim Schulz explained how the construction bond guarantee fund was operated. It was moved by Commissioner Lunseth and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that the financial statement for December 1962 be adopted. Motion carried.

DECLARATION OF INTENT (Biological Survey)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that in 1934 the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service filed a Declaration of Intent to utilize certain specified

unappropriated waters as of that date of the State of North Dakota. Such Declaration of Intent was filed pursuant to a provision of the statutes of North Dakota, which in 1943 was repealed. This Declaration of Intent of the Department of Agriculture and the U. S. Biological Survey (now the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service) covered practically all the unappropriated waters of the

State. As already mentioned, this law was repealed in 1943 and repealed with it was the provision that failure to file plans of the proposed work within three years the waters shall revert to public waters subject to general appropriations. This matter has been discussed with the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service but the State Engineer has been unable to get any statement from that agency that it would not hold the Water Commission to this Declaration of Intent. Since this law has been repealed there could be a cloud on every water right issued since that time.

Mr. Fredrickson stated that the water laws are being revised and provision is being made for a procedure to cancel unused water rights. Whether the Federal Government will abide by such cancellation is not known. Senate Concurrent Resolution C has been introduced in the Legislature requesting Congress to remove this apparent cloud upon and to disclaim any interest on the part of the United States to certain unused waters in North Dakota under the Declaration of Intent issued by the Secretary of Agriculture of the United States.

VILLAGE OF SURREY REQUEST FOR GROUNDWATER STUDY #992 A resolution requesting the North Dakota State Water Conservation Commission to make a groundwater survey in the Surrey vicinity to determine the availability of ground water for village use

was received in the office of the State Engineer. It was moved by Commissioner Lunseth and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that the State Engineer negotiate with the Village of Surrey for a groundwater study. Motion carried.

SHEYENNE RIVER SNAGGING AND CLEARING #568 One of the assurances required by the Corps of Engineers prior to the building of the Baldhill dam and reservoir was a statement by the Commission indicating that they would maintain

the Sheyenne River clear of detrimental obstructions. The Commission with the exception of Cass County has been unable to secure participation on the part of the other counties through which the Sheyenne River flows. The manpower for the snagging and clearing of the Sheyenne River can be very extensive if carried on as a leaf raking project. Governor Guy suggested that possibly the Welfare Board should provide the Commission with funds to use for Indian Labor wherever possible on Water Commission projects. Governor Guy questioned whether it was advisable to clear the Sheyenne River in view of flooding in the Red River. No action was taken by the Commission members.

The meeting recessed to afford the Commission members an opportunity to attend the meeting of the Senate Natural Resources Committee. When the meeting reconvened Vice Chairman Lunseth presided in the absence of Governor Guy.

SNAGGING AND CLEARING -PARK RIVER #662 Secretary Hoisveen reported that the snagging and clearing on the Park River had been completed. Only one minor complaint has been

received. This pertained to one landowner's opinion that the logs had not been hauled far enough back from the stream.

MORTON COUNTY REQUEST FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF A WATER CONSERVATION AND FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT #994 A Resolution and Petition was received from the Board of County Commissioners of Morton County requesting the State Water Commission to proceed with the establishment of a water conservation and flood control district. The Resolution and Petition are attached and marked Appendices A and B. It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher and seconded by Commissioner Einar Dahl that the Secretary be authorized to conduct hearings in Morton County relative to the establishment of a water conservation and flood control district. Motion carried.

LEGISLATION BEFORE 1963 LEGISLATURE Mr. Fredrickson reported on the legislation before the current session of the Legislature. He stated that the Legislative Research Commit-

tee has recommended a series of amendments and revisions of the water laws relating to drainage, flood control districts, etc. Hearings have been held relative to the multiple purpose fund and the administrative budget. ln addition to the multiple purpose fund of \$300,000 the Commission is asking the Legislature to appropriate an additional \$300,000 for use in providing money for nonfederal cooperation, federal, interstate and international projects and for use in major, emergent and emergency State, and local area projects. The purpose of the request for an additional \$300,000 is to accumulate a fund so when projects are being undertaken by the Federal Government the Water Commission will have money to back up the local assurances to the Federal Government and also to undertake major projects the state might want to carry on in cooperation with local groups. The Bowman-Haley project was cited as an example of a Federal project with local participation. Mr. Fredrickson reviewed the cost participation necessary for the local groups in connection with the Bowman-Haley project and how they expect to raise the necessary funds to meet their share of the cost.

Many projects are in the sparsely settled areas where the tax base is small and these areas need state participation. The Legislature is being asked to begin with \$300,000 for the next biennium, which amount is included in and would remain in the multiple purpose fund and leaves it up to the Water Commission by rules and regulations to put the money aside to be used only for certain type projects which the Commission will prescribe.

Mr. Gallagher felt that there should be some distinction between the multiple purpose fund's \$300,000 and the \$300,000 asked as matching federal funds. He recommended that the Drayton project be considered as a multiple purpose fund and the Bowman-Haley project be considered as matching funds with the Federal Government. Mr. Gallagher was of the opinion that before the Water Commission appeared before the Senate Appropriations Committee the multiple purpose fund should be spelled out in detail. He suggested that the State Engineer go back to the beginning of the multiple purpose fund and set out how it was spent in the past. Fundamentally, he suggested there should be a distinction between the \$300,000 general multiple purpose fund and the \$300,000 asked for in section 2; and the term "Emergency" should be defined. Another distinction pointed out by him was that section 2 relates to providing nonfederal construction costs and participation and says nothing about investigations and surveys, whereas, the multiple purpose fund is for investigations and surveys, etc.

RED RIVER NONNAVIGABLE Commissioner Lunseth said that probably the Commission should investigate to see if the Red River at the proposed location of the Drayton

Dam has been declared a nonnavigable stream for the purpose of building the dam. It will probably be necessary to secure permission from Minnesota to attach the dam to their soil. Note - It has been determined that it is not now a navigable stream.

REVERSION OF FUNDS

Commissioner Gallagher stated that a bill has been introduced which provides that any funds

which are not expended within 30 days after the biennium revert to the general fund. In the Water Commission such a law is not feasible where we have the multiple purpose fund and federal matching funds. Emerson Murray has been requested to draw up an amendment to this bill so the multiple purpose fund monies will not revert like other funds. These funds are required for anticipated future water projects.

The meeting recessed until 1:30 p.m.

When the meeting convened Governor Guy was absent and Vice Chairman Lunseth presided at the meeting.

ELM RIVER DAM PROJECT #501 PROTEST Mr. Russell Stuart, Commissioner, Game and Fish Department, reviewed the background of the Elm River Dam Project. The project was approved by

the State Water Commission in October, 1961. Agreements were signed by the State Game and Fish Department and the West Dickey County Water Conservation and Flood Control District whereby the parties agreed to share the construction costs for the dam on an equal basis. The dam is to be an integral part of State Highway #11 which passes over the Elm River approximately 6 miles west of Ellendale. The City of Ellendale has proposed the use of the project as a source of municipal water supply as well as providing that area with a recreational facility. An impoundment above Highway #11 is to be created through the construction of a combination bridge and spillway. The cost of the project other than that required by the highway embankment and bridge construction, was estimated to be \$63,000. The construction of the combination bridge and spillway necessitates relocation of the present east-west township road which he travels. Mr. Gulke is protesting the changing of this road. An easement has been secured from Mr. Gulke, and is on file in the office of the State Game and Fish Department. Mr. Gulke applied to the Court for a restraining order on those involved in the construction of the bridge and spillway enjoining activities regarding the erection of the dam across the Elm River. This action was dismissed. Mr. Gulke is of the opinion that the basement of his new home will be flooded by subterranean waters. The spillway crest of the proposed dam has been established at elevation 1486 MSL which is 5 feet below the flow easement signed by Mr. Gulke.

Mr. Gulke and his attorney Frank Knox of Fargo appeared before the Commission. Mr. Knox stated that the building of a proposed dam in that area will back the water up so it will spill through and cut off Mr. Gulke's road. Mr. Knox pointed out on a map the location of Mr. Gulke's buildings. The present road is Mr. Gulke's access to town and to his farm in the other section. The proposed relocated road will mean that he will have to travel 6 miles to reach his farm in the other section across the river. Besides his basement being flooded his well will become useless. Mr. Knox was of the opinion that Mr. Gulke should have adequate compensation for the resulting damages to his property.

Mr. Gallagher stated that there was nothing the Commission could do to alleviate Mr. Gulke's problem. Vice Chairman Lunseth stated the Commission would take the matter under advisement and advise Mr. Gulke of its decision at a later date.

PROPOSED STATE RETIREMENT PLAN Secretary Hoisveen informed the Commission of a bill that is to be introduced in the present session of the Legislature which would authorize

the adoption by the State and departments, boards, etc., of a pension plan for state employees. This is permissive legislation.

WEATHER MODIFICATION CLOUD SEEDING PROJECT #869 Messrs. Maurice Birkholz and Norman Patzke appeared before the Commission concerning weather modification in North Dakota. Mr. Birkholz stated that the purpose of his organization

"Cloud Modification Service" is modification of weather and cloud formations to increase precipitation and discourage the possibility and probability of hail. Initiating precipitation refers to the process of causing precipitation from clouds that would not otherwise precipitate, or, it is the process of starting precipitation significantly earlier than it would have occurred naturally. Mr. Birkholz stated that his organization was not pushing for weather modification legislation in North Dakota as it was his opinion this legislation should come through some other group than his organization. Mr. Fredrickson discussed the South Dakota weather modification legislation.

WELL DRILLERS

Messrs. Stemen, Opp, and Walker appeared before the Commission relative to licensing of well drillers in the State of North Dakota. Mr.

Fredrickson explained the proposed well drillers bill which may be presented to the Legislature for consideration. Some changes were suggested. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin that the State Water Commission support the well drillers legislation as proposed in the draft of the bill. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Steinberger and carried.

MOUSE RIVER PARK PROBLEM, PROJECT #996 Mr. Steinberger stated that the Fish and Wildlife Service is operating a dam, on the Mouse River east of Tolley known as Carter dam. The gate

in this structure was left open this fall and the water drained, which denies water for use by the Mouse River Park. The park is operated and owned by Renville County. It was constructed by private capital and turned over to the County in 1913. There are 130 cabins in this area. When the dam is drained they have no drinking water and there is no water for sewage dilution. The County Commissioners have had this situation under consideration and are much concerned over the devaluation of the property resulting from such operation. It is possible that negotiations with the Fish and Wildlife over the regulation of Coffer Dam gate will be instigated. As soon as studies have been made the information will be given to the Commission members.

LEGISLATION RELATIVE TO FLOWING WELLS The problem of flowing wells was brought to the attention of the Commission members. Flowing or artesian wells are under the jurisdiction of

the State Geologist. He has expressed a desire to have this authority placed elsewhere. There are several flowing wells in the Ellendale area and west of the river which are becoming more and more problematic relative to this matter. It was recommended that further information be secured and presented to the Commission members before a decision is made.

PROPOSED BUDGET

Copies of the Information For Commission Members Pertaining to the Proposed 1963-1965 Budget were forwarded to the Commission members for their

information.

AUTHORITY TO LET BIDS ON A COMPACT SEDAN Secretary Hoisveen requested authority to let bids on a compact sedan. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner

Einar Dahl that the Secretary be authorized to let bids on a compact sedan for Commission use. Motion carried.

AUTHORITY TO LET BIDSSecretary Hoisveen explained the need for a crawlerON A CRAWLER TYPEtype overhead loader and requested authority toOVERHEAD LOADERlet bids for the purchase of such a vehicle. Itwas moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by

Commissioner Gallagher that the Secretary be granted authority to let bids on a crawler type overhead loader. Motion carried.

by Commissioner Gallagher that Hilmer Gustafson be granted the right to divert 6 acre-feet of water from an Unnamed Tributary of Spring Creek to irrigate 6 acres. Motion carried.

1051 Richard Steffenson, Hensler, requests the right to divert 156 acre-feet of water from the Missouri River and Unnamed Tributary to Shirk Creek, Tributary to the Missouri to irrigate 78 acres. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Gallagher that Richard Steffenson be granted the right to divert 156 acre-feet of water from the Missouri River and Unnamed Tributary to Shirk Creek, Tributary to the Missouri to irrigate 78 acres with maximum diversion from Unnamed Tributary to Shirk Creek of 8 acre-feet for 8 acres. Motion carried.

Edmund Pribyl, Manning, requests the right to divert 73 acre-feet of water from Crooked Creek, tributary of Knife River to irrigate 36.4 acres. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Gallagher that Edmund Pribyl be granted the right to divert 15 acre-feet of water from Crooked Creek, tributary of Knife River to irrigate 15 acres, provided diversion will be curtailed when downstream flows are less than 5 c.f.s.

1053 Bernard Pease, Emmet, requests the right to divert 40 acre-feet of water from Dry Draw, surface runoff, Tributary to Missouri River to irrigate 20 acres. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Gallagher that Bernard Pease be granted the right to divert 40 acre-feet of water from Dry Draw to irrigate 20 acres, providing flows are maintained for downstream users.

1054 Garry Pearson, Grand Forks, requests the right to divert 2 acre-feet of water from the Red River to irrigate 1 acre. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Gallagher that Garry Pearson be granted the right to divert 1.5 acrefeet of water from the Red River to irrigate 1 acre.

1058 Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, Minneapolis, Minnesota, requests the right to divert 840 acre-feet of water from a Dry Draw and groundwater from well in James

James River Valley for wildlife research. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Gallagher that the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife be granted the right to divert 840 acre-feet of water from a Dry Draw and groundwater from well in James River Valley for wildlife research, subject to installation of waste water lagoons which have approval by the State Health Department and the State Water Commission. Motion carried.
