NORTH DAKOTA STATE WATER COMMISSION Held in Office of State Water Commission Bismarck, North Dakota September 23, 1968

The meeting opened at 9:15 a.m. with Vice Chairman Gallagher presiding. Present were Commissioners Jungroth, Dahl and Secretary Hoisveen.

MINUTES OF JULY 13, 1968
MEETING APPROVED

Commissioner Jungroth moved that the reading of the minutes be dispsensed with and that they be approved as circulated.

The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dahl, carried.

SWEETWATER-DRY LAKE WATER
MANAGEMENT DISTRICT ET AL LETTER OF APPRECIATION

A letter expressing the appreciation of Walsh County, Cavalier County and Sweetwater-Dry Lake Water Management Districts and the Ramsey County Soil Conservation

District for Water Commission assistance in getting approval for planning the Edmore Watershed under P.L. 566, Small Watershed Program, was read.

BUFORD-TRENTON !RRIGATION DISTRICT (#222)

A letter was read expressing the appreciation of the Buford-Trenton Irrigation District for Commission assistance through

the Water Commission Construction Engineer and the field crew in raising the motors to a safe level.

STATE WATER PLAN (#322)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the dam site surveys in the lignite fields are related to the Missouri Basin Inter-Agency

Committee study which has been underway to complete an over-all comprehensive plan for the Basin. The State Water Commission has been making a study of the water requirements to meet the needs of thermal generation plants. The Missouri Basin Study Group came up with a need of 2,149,000 acre-feet of water by 1980. The State Water Commission study shows a need for 180,000 acre-feet storage through dam construction and 2,780,000 acre-feet from free flow in the Missouri River. A draft of the Federal Power Commission's findings has been received. They indicate that the State Water Commission's water

requirement is in excess to theirs, however, we have recognized evaporation which is a considerable factor in these large water using plants. The Federal Power Commission also implied that North Dakota will have a greater power generation than the Commission anticipated which we are glad to hear. The thermal plants are a real contribution to the State's economy. North Dakota State University and the State Water Commission have made a study of the generating plants to see what effect they have on the State's economy. Secretary Hoisveen referred the study figures to Assistant Secretary Schulz.

Mr. Schulz stated that the Commission received a letter from the North Dakota State University on this study this morning and preliminary data indicates that for one plant's annual direct expenditures of \$2.8 million, indirect income of \$7 million is created in the State.

Commissioners Dushinske and Steinberger

enter the meeting.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR JULY AND AUGUST 1968 APPROVED

Jim Schulz reviewed the August financial statement.

It was moved by Commissioner Dushinske, seconded by Commissioner Dahl and carried that the financial statements for July and August, 1968 be approved.

WATER SUPPLY FOR SENTINEL SYSTEM (#944)

At a previous meeting the Commissioners authorized \$30,000 for a crash program to locate water for the Sentinel Missile System. A letter from the Corps of

Engineers states "The assistance your office has provided the Omaha District in investigating and reporting on possible sources of water for the Sentinel System in your State is deeply appreciated. The report submitted was in such detail that it will be possible to select the source of supply without additional investigation." Work is now being started in the well field. The construction program will approximate \$300 million. Eventually 2,400 permanent employees, mostly of a professional type, will be assigned to the project.

OAKES AREA, GARRISON DIVERSION UNIT -ALTERATION OF IRRIGATION SYSTEM (#237)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Bureau of Reclamation has made numerous studies throughout the Garrison Diversion Unit with respect to the possibility of using pipe lines and sprinkler systems instead

of gravity irrigation. The Bureau has made a study and issued a report on the Dakes area. The members of the irrigation district have accepted the proposal for a sprinkler system. When a drastic change is made in a federal project it is necessary that the Water Commission approve or disapprove the change. The power rate to be paid by the irrigator was discussed. Commissioner Dushinske suggested that the Commission recommend that the power rate be given further study as it involves the possible use of natural gas or electricity. Likewise the Bureau of Reclamation will have power available to operate its pumps and the possible use of a power arrangement with the Bureau of Reclamation might be considered.

It was moved by Commissioner Dushinske, seconded by Commissioner Steinberger and carried that the Commission approve the request to alter the irrigation system in the Oakes area, Garrison Diversion Unit, with the suggestion and recommendation that the Bureau of Reclamation give further study and consideration to the power rate structure.

STUTSMAN DRAIN #2 (Courtenay Drain) (#1473)

as well as within it.

Commissioner Jungroth stated that a drain in the vicinity of Courtenay is badly needed. The drainage problem involves the land adjacent to the city

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the total cost of the drain would be \$28,000, with the Commission's share \$8,021.20.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Dushinske and carried that the Commission participate in the Courtenay Drain costs to the extent of \$8,021.20.

PEMBINA COUNTY DRAIN #24 (#1148)

The Pembina County Water Management and Drainage District is requesting participation in the cost of improving Pembina Drain #24. The total cost could be

\$2,121. The Commission's eligible participation would be \$848. Secretary Hoisveen recommended that the Commission participate in Pembina County Drain #24.

It was moved by Commissioner Dushinske, seconded by Commissioner Dahl and carried that the Commission participate in the improvement of Pembina County Drain #24 to the extent of \$848.

GRAND FORKS COUNTY DRAIN #39 (#1499)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that Grand forks County Drain #39 is a new drain located between Kelly Slough and Saltwater Coulee. The drainage problem in

this area has been in district court and has been appealed to the Supreme Court. They are now in a position to proceed. The total cost is \$5,445 with the Commission's share being \$2,178. Secretary Hoisveen recommended that the Commission participate in the cost of this drain.

It was moved by Commissioner Dushinske, seconded by Commissioner Jungroth and carried that the Commission participate in the cost of Grand Forks Drain #39 to the extent of \$2,178.

CASS COUNTY DRAIN #24 (#1077)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the request for participation in Cass County Drain #24 was a rebuilding project. An

eight foot bottom is being put in the drain with 3:1 side slopes. The total is estimated at \$11,000 with the Commission's eligible participation being \$3,291.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Dahl and carried that the Commission participate in the cost of Cass County Drain #24 to the extent of \$3,291.

CASS COUNTY DRAIN #26 (#1079)

Cass County Drain #26 was constructed back in 1947-1948. The total cost of reconstruction is \$14,000 with the Com-

mission's cost participation proposed at \$4,753, taking into consideration hydraulic improvements.

It was moved by Commissioner Dahl, seconded by Commissioner Dushinske and carried that the Commission participate in the cost of Cass County Drain #29 to the extent of \$4,753.

OLSON DAM (#260)

A \$200 deposit has been made by the Wilton Wildlife Club and Izaak Walton

League to investigate the feasibility of repairing or reconstructing Olson Dam in northern Burleigh County.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Dahl and carried that the Commission survey the feasibility of repairing or reconstructing Olson Dam.

MEDORA DAM (#1503)

The Commission received a call as to the feasibility of a dam in the vicinity

of Medora. There is a possibility that a group of Bismarck men would be interested in promoting this project. A request was made for a cost estimate so it could be submitted to the Legislature when it convenes. Commissioner Jungroth stated that it could be a tourist attraction and should be explored to see if it is feasible. Secretary Hoisveen stated that he explored the area recently and there are a number of places where dams could be constructed if there is sufficient water to maintain an adequate lake.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Dahl and carried that the Commission investigate the possibility of installing a dam in the Medora area.

MISSOURI RIVER BANK RECTIFICATION WORKS (#576) The Senate and House Conference Committee on Public Works approved \$1,670,000 for bank stabilization on the Missouri River in the Bismarck-Mandan area. Secretary

Hoisveen stated that it was hoped that the work could be started this fall. The State Water Commission will be requested to give the "a,b,c" assurances.

Governor Guy had prepared a resolution and presented it to the Missouri Basin Inter-Agency Committee requesting their recommendation concerning operation and maintenance costs on bank stabilization projects. The Missouri Basin Inter-Agency Committee did not take action. They did, however, send the resolution to the Water Resources Council. Secretary Hoisveen talked to General Cassidy and he indicated they were going to make a study of all areas below Corps of Engineers' dams with the purpose of coming up with some policy in regard to the operation and maintenance of these projects.

INCREASED INTEREST RATE (G-11)

An editorial appeared in the Minot Daily News with regard to higher interest rates for new water projects.

The State Water Commission filed a statement with the Water Resources Council in Washington pointing out the dangers of a sharp increase in the interest rate for determining feasibility of water development projects.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Dushinske and carried that the Secretary be commended for his diligence in sending a letter to the Water Resources Council protesting the increased interest rate for federal water projects.

SMALL WATERSHED PROJECTS (#1390)

Commissioner Dushinske pointed out that the funds of the Soil Conservation Service were being reduced for small

watershed projects. He suggested sending a letter protesting this reduction. Secretary Hoisveen stated that a day letter had been sent to Representative Aspinall requesting his support of the passage of \$862.

It was moved by Commissioner Dushinske, seconded by Commissioner Steinberger and carried that a letter or telegram be sent protesting the reduction of funds for small watershed projects.

KINDRED DAM ASSURANCES (#1344)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Commission has been requested to furnish assurances to the Corps of Engineers

on Kindred Dam. In the past the assurances have been worked out with the local entities. The Corps of Engineers is now giving a three year post-construction free operation and maintenance period. The State Water Commission has adopted a resolution supporting Kindred Dam, which support has been reaffirmed.

Mr. Grindberg stated that he had just talked to Robert Calton, Corps of Engineers. They have promised Senator Young a report on Kindred Dam. The Corps would like a letter from the sponsor that there is a reasonable possibility funds can be provided. The Corps does not consider such a letter binding but would like some indication that the Water Commission feels these necessary commitments will be met when the time comes.

It was moved by Commissioner Dushinske, seconded by Commissioner Dahl that, based on the previous actions of the Commission and the powers vested in the Commission, subject to procuring funds from future legislatures, the Commission would agree to sponsor the Kindred Dam Project and would secure the necessary commitments prior to development.

On Roll Call Commissioners Dushinske, Gallagher, Steinberger and Dahl voted yes. Commissioner Jungroth voted no.

WATER PERMITS #1561, 1564-1585, 1587-1592 (See Appendix A)

Secretary Hoisveen presented 29 water permits to the Commission for consideration. It was the recommendation of the State Engineer that these water permits be approved and that the permits of

Marvin Kienzle, Woodworth, Permit #1587, and Leno Schulz, Woodworth, Permit #1590, although approved are deferred pending further investigation of the aquifer.

It was moved by Commissioner Dushinske, seconded by Commissioner Jungroth and carried that the 29 water permits be approved, subject to such conditions as indicated on the permit and that the water permits of Marvin Kienzle and Leno Schulz although approved are deferred pending further investigation of the aquifer.

MINOT WATER SUPPLY (#782)

Mr. Grindberg stated that the Commission's Ground-Water Engineer has stated that if the inter-ties exist between the aquifers

like he thinks they do, it is going to turn out to be a better water supply for Minot than was first thought.

SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE TYPE IV RIVER BASIN PLANS

Mr. Schulz stated that the Soil Conservation Service has a program available whereby they will conduct TYPE IV River Basin Studies. Included in a TYPE IV

study would be proposals for water and related land resources development in the same manner as the Commission plans in its next phase of comprehensive river basin planning. There is no state cost participation.

STATE WATER PLAN (#322)

for discussion.

STATE WATER COMMISSION MEETING IN FARGO (Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission) Commissioner Gallagher suggested that as each phase of the State Water Plan is completed that it be placed on the agenda

Commissioner Gallagher suggested that a Commission meeting be held in Fargo at some future date so the Commission could visit the Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission.

The meeting adjourned at 12 noon.
