# NORTH DAKOTA STATE WATER COMMISSION Held in Fred J. Fredrickson Memorial Library Bismarck, North Dakota

May 22, 1970

The meeting was called to order at 9:35 a.m. in the Fred J. Fredrickson Memorial Library with Governor William L. Guy presiding.

MINUTES OF MARCH 25, 1970 MEETING APPROVED

Commissioner Jungroth moved and Commissioner Hanson seconded that the minutes of the March 25, 1970 meeting be approved as

circulated. All members voted aye.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR MARCH AND APRIL, 1970 APPROVED Matt Emerson, Assistant Secretary for the North Dakota State Water Commission, presented the financial statements for the months of March and April, 1970.

There was a brief discussion of the statements following Mr. Emerson's remarks on the various accounts.

Commissioner Dushinske moved the approval of the financial statements for the months of March and April, 1970. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye.

WELCOME TO COMMISSIONER ALVIN KRAMER, MINOT

Governor Guy, in behalf of the Commission members, welcomed Alvin Kramer to the Commission. The Governor presented a brief history of Commissioner Kramer's water-related efforts.

REQUEST FROM MONTANA-DAKOTA UTILITIES COMPANY FOR APPROVAL OF PIPELINE STREAM CROSSINGS (#1373)

At the March 25, 1970 Commission meeting, Commissioner Dushinske stated that he had noted several pipeline stream crossings were being made in the Devils Lake area. It was noted at that time that Montana-

Dakota Utilities Company had not requested approval from the State Water Commission office to install these pipelines.

Montana-Dakota Utilities Company has now requested approval from the State Water Commission to construct a pipeline system extending from Bismarck easterly to serve Jamestown, Valley City, Devils Lake and nine smaller towns along the route.

Secretary Hoisveen read a memorandum written by Assistant Chief Engineer, Mr. Alan Grindberg, indicating the streams they would have to cross. The pipelines will be used to carry natural gas only and will be of welded steel construction. In the event a gas leak did occur, there would not be a water pollution problem. Secretary Hoisveen stated that it was his recommendation that the Commission grant Montana-Dakota Utilities Company permission to install the natural gas pipelines.

> Commissioner Jungroth moved that the Commission grant Montana-Dakota Utilities Company permission to install natural gas pipelines across the North Dakota streams mentioned. Commissioner Dahl seconded and all members voted aye.

#### REPAIR OF DAMS

A. SHEEP CREEK DAM (#1358)

Secretary Hoisveen reported that the State Water Commission had experienced its first loss in the way of a dam. Construction

was completed last fall on the Sheep Creek Dam located approximately four miles south of Elgin, North Dakota. The final inspection had been made in late fall of 1969.

During the first week in May, 1970, Sheep Creek Dam and surrounding areas experienced a heavy rainfall. Trouble developed in the pipe spillway when the water reached a  $5\frac{1}{2}$  foot level. The whole pipeline section is destroyed and a section of the embankment washed out. There is much debris and rubbish in the water which will need to be cleaned up with repair of the dam.

Alan Grindberg showed the Commission slides of the Sheep Creek Dam which had been destroyed and briefly explained what had happened.

Secretary Hoisveen stated that on May 27, 1970, representatives from the U. S. Corps of Engineers, the Bureau of Reclamation, Soil Conservation Service, Grant County Water Management District and the State Water Commission are planning a joint inspection of Sheep Creek Dam. He also explained the way in which the dam would be repaired.

B. BURLINGTON DAM JUDGE CHRISTENSEN PROJECT (#221)

Secretary Hoisveen explained the situation on the Burlington Dam Judge Christensen project. He stated that the embankment failed on the dam which had been there for

approximately 35 years. Through investigation of the failure, it was found that a burrowing animal had made its way through the dike and the resulting washout caused considerable cutout of the dike.

Secretary Hoisveen stated that it was his recommendation that the Commission make an application for funds to the Office of Emergency Preparedness for the repair of dams, but that the Commission would have to spend some of its own funds to effect repairs of these projects.

Commissioner Gallagher moved that the State Water Commission approve the expenditure of up to \$100,000 for dam repair costs to supplement Federal emergency funds. Commissioner Dushinske seconded and all members voted aye.

U. S. BUREAU OF RECLAMATION FEE CHARGE FOR IRRIGATION PUMPING FROM CORPS OF ENGINEERS RESERVOIRS (#1494)

Secretary Hoisveen reported briefly on the status of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation's intent to charge for irrigation pumping from Corps of Engineers reservoirs. On May 1, 1970, Governor Guy received a letter from Assistant Secretary of the

Interior, James R. Smith, stating that if a private irrigator's water supply is not dependent upon federally constructed facilities, such private irrigator is not subject to federal reclamation laws and need not enter into a water service contract with the Bureau of Reclamation. A meeting will be held at a future date with other Missouri River Basin states to try and explore the possibilities of establishing certain requirements prior to approving and supporting future federally constructed water-related facilities.

REQUEST FOR SURVEY TO IMPROVE GASCOYNE LAKE - BOWMAN COUNTY WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT (#557)

Secretary Hoisveen reported that the State Water Commission has received a request from the Bowman County Water Management District, along with the initial \$200 fee, to investigate and study the feasibility of improving Gascoyne Lake

as a water-based recreation area. This would include raising the Gascoyne Lake level to make it more adaptable to a sporting and recreation area.

It was the recommendation of Secretary Hoisveen that the Commission investigate and study the Gascoyne Lake area.

Commissioner Hanson moved that the Commission investigate and study the present Gascoyne Lake area, proposing to raise the present lake level to make it more adaptable for a recreation area. Commissioner Dahl seconded and all members voted aye.

#### DRAINS

A. CASS COUNTY DRAIN NO. 14 (#1070)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Cass County Drain Board if making a request to the State Water Commission for State

participation of \$1,148 in excess of the original drain cost of \$3,640. This excess cost is due to a combination of low yardage per lineal foot of drain and a late start on construction, since bids were not opened until September 17, 1969.

It was the recommendation of Secretary Hoisveen to participate in Cass County Drain No. 14 in the amount of \$1,148.

B. CASS COUNTY DRAIN NO. 41 (#1091)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Cass County Drain Board is requesting the State Water Commission for State partici-

pation in the cleaning out and re-construction of Cass County Drain No. 41 in the amount of \$2,491.80. The total cost of the re-construction project is \$6,229.50. The Commission participated in previous construction of this drain in 1948, whereby the project was constructed to design side slopes of 2:1. The present re-construction project calls for 4:1 side slopes except for 3:1 side slopes in the lower 2900 feet of the outlet into the Elm River. The new drain will also be deepened.

It was the recommendation of Secretary Hoisveen that the State Water Commission participate in the re-construction and cleaning out of Cass County Drain No. 41 in the amount of \$2,491.80.

C. CASS COUNTY DRAIN NO. 39 (#1089)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Cass County Drain Board has made a request to the State Water Commission for State

participation in the amount of \$13,588 for re-construction of 6.95 miles of ditch with no anticipated change needed in the drop structure. The total overall cost of Cass County Drain No. 39 is \$43,489.50.

Secretary Hoisveen recommended to the Commission that State participation be granted in the amount of \$13,588 for the re-construction of Cass County Drain No. 39.

D. CASS COUNTY DRAIN NO. 50 (#1528)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Cass County Drain Board has made a request to the State Water Commission for State

participation in construction of Cass County Drain No. 50 in the amount of \$5,027.20. The total estimated cost of the project is \$12,568. The new drain is approximately two miles with pipe drop into the Sheyenne River.

It was the recommendation of Secretary Hoisveen that the State Weter Commission participate in construction of Cass County Drain No. 50 in an amount not to exceed \$5,027.20.

Commissioner Jungroth moved that the State Water Commission participate in the following drains and not to exceed the following amounts:

- A. Cass County Drain No. 14 \$1,148
- B. Cass County Drain No. 41 \$2,491.80
- C. Cass County Drain No. 39 \$13,588
- D. Cass County Drain No. 50 \$5,027.20

Commissioner Hanson seconded the motion and all members voted aye.

MR. TONY ENGELHARDT, MINNEWAUKAN, APPEARANCE ON WEST BAY DEVILS LAKE (#416) Mr. Tony Engelhardt, Minnewaukan, Miles Maddock, Maddock, Duane Howard, Minnewaukan, Harold Michels, Minnewaukan, and Mr. John Haugland, Attorney, Devils Lake, all representing a group of Benson County

landowners, appeared before the Commission. Mr. Engelhardt wasthe spokesman for the group. He very extensively discussed the status that has led up to the present problems in the West Bay area. The landowners in this area wish to drain some of the water out of the Devils Lake into the East Bay, thereby causing the water to drain out of the West Bay into Devils Lake. This would again make it possible for the farmers to have pasture and hayland which they have been deprived of for a number of years. They feel that installing culverts in the East Bay and maintaining Devils Lake at a lower level would make this a reality. He stated that approximately 2,000 acres of hayland will be lost this year if nothing is done at present.

Mr. Grindberg stated that from recent meetings with the State Highway Department, it is his understanding that the Highway Department will match the Great Northern Railway Company in whatever agreement is reached.

Commissioner Dushinske stated that it is his feeling that a definite lake level must be established for Devils Lake, then determine the needed culvert capacity and then the State Highway Department, the Great Northern Railway Company and the State Water Commission hold a meeting and establish what should be done. He also stated that perhaps those landowners who are concerned with the early acquisition of land in the West Bay area get together and see if there is anything else possible to hasten early acquisition of their land. Action on this was deferred until later in the meeting.

The Commission then recessed for lunch at 11:45 a.m. at the Gourmet House where Mr. Edward Lundberg, Project Manager for the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, Bismarck, was the speaker. Mr. Lundberg's main topic

to the Commission was a brief discussion of future and proposed projects of the Bureau of Reclamation. One of their main projects is the relocation of the New Rockford Canal through Wells County.

The Commission reconvened with the regular

meeting at 1:30 p.m.

REQUEST BY THE SWEETWATER-DRY LAKE WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT FOR A SURVEY OF ST. JOE COULEE (#722) Secretary Hoisveen read a letter from Gordon Berg, Chairman, Sweetwater-Dry Lake Water Management District, in regard to a survey of St. Joe Coulee, which drains into Mike's Lake west of Dry Lake. The

proposal is to bring this coulee into the north end of Dry Lake. The request is for engineering assistance from the State Water Commission.

Secretary Hoisveen's recommendation is that the Sweetwater-Dry Lake Water Management District be notified that the State Water Commission will participate in the survey of the St. Joe Coulee.

Commissioner Dahl moved that the State Water Commission participate in the investigation and survey of the St. Joe Coulee and for engineering assistance. Commissioner Kramer seconded and all members voted aye.

REQUEST BY THE EATON FLOOD IRRIGATION DISTRICT FOR ASSISTANCE IN DETERMINING FLOODS CUASED BY OPERATION OF DAM (#227) Secretary Hoisveen read a letter from Attorney Jonathan C. Eaton, Jr., Minot, North Dakota, stating that approximately six landowners located some eight to fifteen river miles upstream from the Eaton Dam had obtained an injunction against the Flood Irrigation Board

requiring them to open all the gates on the dam and to do some snagging operations. This dam is an irrigation project. Their request is for expert engineering advice. from the State Water Commission to have some levels run and to compute the effects of the dam both at times of high water and in normal years. The landowner claimed that neither they nor their predecessors had at any time given the Flood Board any easements or other license to raise water on or over their lands.

After a brief discussion, it was the consensus of the Commission that it should not provide information for a law suit, but that all Commission files should be open to the public in the event information is sought.

Commissioner Kramer moved that the Commission notify the Eaton Irrigation Flood Board that it will not provide engineering for a law suit, but that the files will be open for inspection in the event the District so desires. Commissioner Jungroth seconded and all members voted aye. REQUEST FOR DESIGN AND COST PARTICIPATION IN THE PROPOSED HILLSBORO DAM (#1476) Honorable Eldred Dornacker, North Dakota State Representative, Mr. John Nelson, City Auditor, Hillsboro, and Mr. Ronald Stuart, President of the City Council, City of Hillsboro, appeared before the

Commission. The spokesman for the group was Representative Dornacker. He passed around copies of a statistical sheet that was prepared showing the economic value of a sugar beet factory to North Dakota. After reviewing these statistics, Representative Dornacker briefly explained to the Commission a proposal to build a multi-purpose dam at a site on the Goose River, immediately west of Hillsboro so that a sugar beet plant may be built at this site. The Traill County Water Management District has agreed to be the sponsoring agency. The approximate estimated cost of this dam would be \$550,000. It is felt that this location is very good for recreational purposes and the pool elevation would be deep enough to support fish.

It was stated that the Commission would make a foundation study in the near future, which would be necessary before the final design. The Commission will not commence construction of the dam until such a time as a definite agreement has been made and signed assuring the construction of a sugar beet plant in the immediate vicinity of Hillsboro. The State Water Commission will then contract with the Traill County Water Management District for the construction of the dam.

Commissioner Jungroth moved that the State Water Commission appropriate \$250,000 towards the construction of a dam at Hillsboro, contingent on the construction of a sugar beet refinery. Commissioner Dahl seconded and all members voted aye.

WELLS COUNTY GROUP PRESENTATION REGARDING CANAL ROUTING (#237)

Mr. Oliver Rodne, Harvey and Mr. Fred Ebel, Fessenden, representing farmers in Wells County, appeared before the Commission. Mr. Ebel was the spokesman

for the two gentlemen and he began by passing around a Certificate creating the Farmers Canal Protestors Association.

Mr. Ebel stated that the proposed canal that will pass through Wells County will take approximately 20 acres out of a quarter section of land. The farmers who are using the water for irrigation are only being assessed \$3.00 per acre more than the farmer who is not using the water.

Mr. Ebel stated that the disadvantages of this canal are many, stating one in particular, that the upkeep of the County is going to be much greater. They feel that by installing an underground pipe rather than putting in a canal would be considerably cheaper and the people in the area agreed.

Commissioner Dushinske asked Mr. Ebel approximately how many landowners would be affected by this canal. Mr. Ebel's reply was about 45 landowners.

Mr. Edward Lundberg, Project Manager for the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, commented briefly on Mr. Ebel's remarks. He stated that he has met previously with these landowners and spoke with them and that any time in the future when they would call a meeting, he would be more than willing to speak to them and try and clarify some of their questions. He stated that the canal would have 2:1 side slopes and would be approximately 14 feet in depth.

WATER PERMITS -#1656, 1664, 1677, 1682, 1686, 1687, 1688, 1689, 1690, 1691, 1692, 1693, 1694, 1696, 1698, 1700, 1701

Secretary Hoisveen presented 17 water permits to the Commission for consideration. It was the recommendation of the State Engineer that these water permits be approved with the exception that water permit Nos. 1698, Kriss W. Enzi, Braddock, and 1664, Roger Hirsch, Mott, be deferred pending further investigation.

Commissioner Jungroth moved that the water permits presented to the Commission be approved as presented with the exception of the deferral of water permits Nos. 1698 and 1664, pending further investigation. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye. (See Appendix "A")

BUCHANAN DRAIN NO. 1 (#1348)

Commissioner Jungroth stated that a letter had been received from the Stutsman County Drain Board requesting possible State

Water Commission participation in future work and work that has been done on Buchanan Drain No. 1. It was established that not enough compensatory wildlife habitat can be offered by the drain users to obtain the approval of the Fish and Wildlife Department, therefore this would prevent the State Water Commission from participating. The Drain Board believes there is a possibility that the Commission could participate in the cost of the culverts installed in the drain.

After a brief discussion by the Commission, it was the consensus of the Commission that no action would be taken on the aforementioned project.

FUTURE MEETING

Secretary Hoisveen stated that Governor Guy has been asked to be the principal speaker at the Big Coulee Dam dedication on June 23, 1970 and that he felt it would be most appropriate to hold a Commission meeting on this date, also. It was the consensus of the Commission that a meeting be held at approximately 10:00 a.m. on

June 23, 1970 in Bisbee.

PEMBINA RIVER FLOOD CONTROL (#567)

Secretary Hoisveen read a resolution passed By the Pembina River Flood Control Association.

Commissioner Dushinske stated that two meetings have been held with the Association and the State Water Commission relative to the flooding. The Corps of Engineers is going to proceed to study the feasibility for the United States constructing their portion of the International Joint Commission approved project plan that provides for flood control and municipal water supplies with the anticipation of Canada completing their portion at a later date.

REPORT BY MR. EDWARD LUNDBERG, PROJECT MANAGER, U. S. BUREAU OF RECLAMATION Vice Chairman Gallagher stated that Mr. Edward Lundberg did not get a chance to complete his speaking engagement to the Commission during the noon luncheon. Mr.

Lundberg then proceeded to finish. He continued speaking on work that is being done and future work that will be done by the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation. He gave a brief review of the Garrison Diversion project. He stated that William Clairmont had been awarded the contract for the first phase of work on the McClusky Canal and that work is progressing.

Mr. Lundberg stated that a representative or representatives from his office will accompany State Water Commission engineers to Sheep Creek Dam near Elgin on May 27, 1970 for the inspection of the failure.

WEST BAY DEVILS LAKE (#416)

The Commission briefly discussed the West Bay area in Devils Lake after listening to Mr. Tony Engelhardt's talk. It was

the consensus of the Commission that a level of 1416 feet above mean sea level be established in Devils Lake and that the State Highway Department, the Great Northern Railway Company and the State Water Commission staff work together to determine the required culvert depth through Highway 20 to maintain this elevation. The Railway Company should also be notified immediately to clean out the culvert that is filled with debris and sand blocking the water.

Commissioner Dushinske moved that the level of 1416 feet above mean sea level be established as the minimum level of Devils Lake and that the State Highway Department and the State Water Commission staff work together to determine the required culvert depth through Highway 20 to maintain this elevation. The amount of opening the State Highway Department is willing to install should also be determined and a commitment made to do such work should be transmitted to the local proponents so that they can obtain a final commitment from the railroad to match. Commissioner Jungroth seconded the motion and all members voted aye.

STATE ENGINEER'S SALARY

Vice Chairman Gallagher stated to the Commission that in comparison to the

Federal Civil Service wages and the salary that Mr. Robert Bradley, Chief Engineer of the State Highway Department, is receiving, the State Engineer's salary is considerably lower. He mentioned that it has now been one year since the Commission had reviewed Mr. Hoisveen's salary.

> Commissioner Jungroth moved that the salary of the State Engineer be increased from the present \$1625 per month to \$1800 per month effective July 1, 1970. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye.
