#### MINUTES

#### NORTH DAKOTA STATE WATER COMMISSION Held in Bisbee High School Bisbee, North Dakota

June 23, 1970

#### PRESENT :

Governor William L. Guy, Chairman Richard P. Gallagher, Vice Chairman Arne Dahl, Commissioner, Department of Agriculture, Bismarck Russell Dushinske, Member from Devils Lake Harold Hanson, Member from New England James Jungroth, Member from Jamestown Alvin Kramer, Member from Minot Milo W. Hoisveen, State Engineer, Chief Engineer and Secretary, State Water Commission, Bismarck

OTHERS PRESENT:

Gordon K. Gray, Valley City Oscar Solberg, North Dakota State Representative, Mylo George Ackre, City Attorney, Cando R. D. Lipp, Cando Alan Grindberg, Assistant Chief Engineer, State Water Commission, Bismarck

Governor William L. Guy called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. in the Bisbee High School.

Mr. George Ackre appeared on behalf of the

City of Cando. Mr. Ackre explained that

the city had a problem on the west side

FLOODING PROBLEM IN CITY OF CANDO (#1532)

of town along Highway No. 281 with surface water drainage. He stated that this water drained from the city and from adjacent farmlands. The State Hospital and other facilities are now in a swamp. In addition to the basement of the Hospital, about 30 homes and the school have their basements flooded.

At the request of the city several years ago, the State Highway Department started to clean the highway ditches. A downstream farmer noticed this ditch cleaning operation underway and informed the State Highway Department that they were violating a moratorium on drainage, which had been installed by the State Water Commission. Upon being informed of this, the State Highway Department stopped and refused to do any more work.

Mr. Ackre also stated that Towner County has decided to go ahead with the water management district and has appointed a board. This board has not, however, met to organize as yet.

Secretary Hoisveen pointed out that this water will be drained into the Chain Lakes area. This problem has been investigated by the State Health Department and has been declared by them to be a health hazard. Secretary Hoisveen recommended that an exception to the moratorium be made in this case if a water management district be formed to deal with this and future flooding. It was emphasized that the wetlands in question is not a waterfowl breeding area.

> It was moved by Commissioner Dushinske that the State Water Commission allow the City of Cando to drain the slough on the southwest edge of town, as has been recommended by the State Health Department. Commissioner Kramer seconded and all members voted aye.

floods, and asking the Corps of Engineers to institute a program to straighten and clean the river from the vicinity to Durbin, North Dakota, to the point where it empties into the Sheyenne River in Cass County.

Commissioner Dahl moved that the State Water Commission recognize this request of the Maple River Water Management District and ask the Corps of Engineers and other water resources agencies to study the Maple River for a beneficial water control program consistent with the Souris-Red-Rainy plan. Commissioner Kramer seconded and all members voted aye.

PEMBINA RIVER FLOOD PROBLEMS (#567) Secretary Hoisveen briefed the Water Commission on the problem of flooding along the Canadian-United States border in Pembina County. Secretary Hoisveen

stated that the Governor had written a letter about the Canadian constructed dike. He further stated that this year there was nine feet of water held up on United States farmland. This is in contravention of the 1909 Treaty as regards the border, which prohibits the stopping of free flow water across the border. Secretary Hoisveen stated that this had been turned over to the State Department and that he had visited with the State Department on his recent visit and was informed that they had contacted Canada in regard to this problem but had not received an answer.

> Commissioner Dushinske moved that the State Water Commission pass a strong resolution directed at the State Department, with copies to the International Joint Commission and the Congressional Delegation, which protests the altering of the flow of water

along the boundary. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye. (See Appendix "A")

REQUEST BY THE WEST DICKEY Secretary Hoisveen read a letter which COUNTY WATER MANAGEMENT requested an investigation in West Dickey DISTRICT FOR AN INVESTIGATION County for a possible dam at a site near OF POLLOCK DAM the location of the old Pollock Dam. (#728) Secretary Hoisveen recommended that the State Water Commission make such a study.

> Commissioner Jungroth moved that the State Water Commission investigate the possibility of constructing a dam in West Dickey County. Commissioner Dahl seconded and all members voted aye.

REPORT ON GOOSE RIVER Secretary Hoisveen reported that the STUDY BY CORPS OF Corps of Engineers wishes to drop the ENGINEERS Goose River study due to the fact that (#235) they have found that the flood control benefits are insufficient to justify the construction of a reservoir, that a better water supply source is available

from groundwater, and that Golden Lake is sufficient to satisfy the recreational demands of the area.

> Commissioner Jungroth moved that the State Water Commission accept the Corps of Engineers recommendation to discontinue their study and that further beneficial uses of water on the Goose River be studied through the Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted ave.

BUFORD-TRENTON IRRIGATION PROJECT (#222)

Secretary Hoisveen reported that the problem on Buford-Trenton Irrigation project, which has been caused by a high river level due to aggradation

at the headwaters of Garrison Reservoir, will be studied by the Corps of Engineers. Senator Young's office reports that they will request funds for the Corps of Engineers to study this problem. Secretary Hoisveen read a resolution of thanks to the State Water Commission from the Buford-Trenton Irrigation District Board. The receipt of this resolution was noted.

CASS COUNTY DRAIN NO. 47 (#1095)

This drain was originally reconstructed in 1953, at which time it was promised that a drop structure would be built. Secretary Hoisveen recommended that the State Water Commission offer to participate only if a drop structure is built and definite assurance of such construction is given.

> Commissioner Hanson moved that the State Water Commission decline to participate in any work on Cass County Drain No. 47 until such time as the

drop structure, which was originally assured in 1953, is constructed. Commissioner Dahl seconded and all members voted aye.

FUTURE MEETING

Secretary Hoisveen read a letter from Mr. Robert Stranik, which invited the State Water Commission to hold its July meeting in Dickinson.

> Commissioner Jungroth moved that the State Water Commission accept the invitation and hold its July meeting in Dickinson. Commissioner Kramer seconded and all members voted aye.

TOLLEY AREA FLOOD PROBLEM (#626)

Secretary Hoisveen reviewed the problem in the Tolley area with excess surface water and stated that the State Water Commission

has received a plan from the Corps of Engineers and will be contacting the Soil Conservation Service for their reaction. The Governor recapped the situation and stated that the area in question is a frying-pan type area lying between the Des Lacs and Souris Rivers. He stated that this area could be drained and several years ago a ditch was planned. The problem is with the cost and the engineering. Drainage of this area would also compound the Souris River flood problem. There are two water management districts involved, Rolette County and Ward County. The Governor stated that a simple solution was not likely in this case.

BUFFALO LAKE DEDICATION Secretary Hoisveen stated that there will (#565) be a dedication of Buffalo Lake at the lake on the 19th of July and that the members of the State Water Commission and the staff have been invited.

STATUS OF CONSTRUCTION (#1)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that due to a late spring, excessive rainfall and the

necessary work in assessing OEP damages, the Water Commission construction program had gotten off to a late start. Projects currently underway are White Earth Dam, Mt. Carmel Dam, Sheep Creek Dam, Erie Dam and McGregor Dam. He also reviewed the investigation which had been made by the Corps of Engineers, Bureau of Reclamation and the Soil Conservation Service of Sheep Creek Dam and stated that the inspectors for these agencies agreed that the fault lay in a defective joint in the principal spillway pipe.

BEULAH FLOOD CONTROL (#1517)

Secretary Hoisveen reported that the Corps of Engineers has looked at and designed a flood control project for the city of

Beulah. This project had local costs in the area of \$360,000. The city has rejected the Corps of Engineers' plan as being too expensive and has now asked the State Water Commission to investigate and see if it is possible to find a cheaper alternative. Secretary Hoisveen recommended that the State Water Commission make such investigations.

> Commissioner Dahl moved that the State Water Commission investigate the flood problem at Beulah and attempt to find an alternative which is economical. Commissioner Jungroth seconded and all members voted aye.

WATER PERMIT NOS. 1674, 1678, 1683, 1697, 1699, 1704, 1705, 1706, and 1707

Secretary Hoisveen presented nine water permits to the Commission for consideration. It was the recommendation of the State Engineer that these water permits be approved.

Commissioner Kramer moved that the nine Conditional Water Permits be approved, subject to such conditions as indicated on the permit. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye. (See Appendix "B")

REQUEST BY NECHE FOR ASSISTANCE IN MAKING A CHANNEL CHANGE IN PEMBINA RIVER (#274)

It was suggested that in view of the time, that the Neche problem be deferred until the next Commission meeting.

Commissioner Hanson moved and Commissioner Dahl seconded that the Commission defer consideration of the Neche cutoff until the next meeting.

AGENDA FOR NEXT MEETING

It was recommended that the State Water Commission should discuss a proposal for a Natural Resources Department. It was recommended that discussion of this proposal be placed on the Agenda for discussion at the next Commission meeting.

MEETING ADJOURNED

and the dedication of Big Coulee Dam.

#### Flood Problems in Pembina County

WHEREAS, on the border between North Dakota and Manitoba in the vicinity of Neche, North Dakota, the Canadians have caused to be constructed a high nine mile long dike; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the construction of this dike, the free flow of water across the border between the United States and Canada has been stopped; and

WHEREAS, the resulting ponding of the water in the United States is causing a great deal of flooding to farmland in this area; and

WHEREAS, this is in direct violation of the treaty existing between the two countries.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Dakota State Water Commission at its regular meeting held in Bisbee, North Dakota, on this 23rd day of June, 1970, that the United States Department of State be urged to do everything in its power to secure the early removal of this dike so that these great flood losses can be reduced as soon as possible; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be forwarded to the International Joint Commission; Senators Nilton R. Young and Quentin N. Burdick; and Congressmen Mark Andrews and Thomas Kleppe.
