MINUTES

NORTH DAKOTA STATE WATER COMMISSION Held at Congress Inn Dickinson, North Dakota

July 24, 1970

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. M.D.T., in a meeting room of the Congress Inn, Dickinson, North Dakota, with Vice Chairman Richard Gallagher presiding.

MINUTES OF JUNE 23, 1970 Commissioner Hanson moved and Commissioner MEETING APPROVED Jungroth seconded that the minutes of the June 23, 1970 meeting be approved as circulated. All members voted aye. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR Due to the presence of other individuals MAY AND JUNE, 1970, AND and the Press, the financial statements 1971-1973 BIENNIUM BUDGET for the months of May and June, 1970, and **REQUEST** the State Water Commission's budget request to the Office of Executive Budget for Fiscal Years 1971 and 1972 are to be circulated by mail to the Commission members for their review and comments. PRESENTATION BY JOHN AMUNDSON Mr. John Amundson appeared before the OF THE BOWMAN COUNTY WATER State Water Commission and made a request MANAGEMENT DISTRICT REGARDING in behalf of the Bowman County Water BOWMAN-HALEY DAM Management District for a \$50,000 payment

schedule committed to the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers as a share of the Bowman-Haley Dam construction costs. Mr. Amundson cited the inability of the city of Bowman to meet its' obligations and he gave a progress report of the Water Management District's actions to date. The total funds accumulated at various banks is approximately \$267,000 and they hope to have \$504,000

to help the District on their repayment

by 1976 when the first of the 40 years of installment payments begin. The Water Management District has already been expending funds for maintenance of the recreation area, which is an asset to the State. A traffic count revealed a total of 2,500 vehicles visited the area during a weekend in May.

Mr. Amundson stated that with the funds now accumulated, the Water Management District has planned to negotiate prepayments on the project and later make annual payments on the distribution system needed to make use of the water for municipal and industrial supply. Commissioner Jungroth questioned the use of funds requested in regard to prepayment. He did not feel the \$50,000 should be used to buy savings certificates. Vice Chairman Gallagher explained the State Water Commission's committment regarding the project sponsorship.

> Commissioner Gray, in behalf of the Vice Chairman, Richard Gallagher, moved that the State Water Commission remit \$50,000 to the Bowman County Water Management District as a part of the Commission's share for prepayment of the construction costs of Bowman-Haley Dam. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye.

REPLIES FROM CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION RELATIVE TO PROBLEM EXISTING ON THE CANADIAN BORDER AND SENATE PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE HEARING AT WALHALLA (#567)

Secretary Hoisveen referred to the State Water Commission's resolution sent to the members of Congress from North Dakota urging them to contact the U. S. State Department in regard to the United States-Canadian border drainage problem in the Pembina River basin. Replies have been received

from each member stating that they did contact the State Department and in turn the Office of Canadian Affairs had contacted the Canadian Government to request some action on the problem. The request was answered by a promise to investigate the situation and that further word would be forthcoming.

Along with the subject of the Pembina River basin, Secretary Hoisveen announced that Senator Burdick was able to schedule a Pembina River basin hearing by the U. S. Senate Subcommittee of the Public Works Committee at Walhalla, North Dakota on September 10, 1970. Senator Stephen M. Young, Chairman, will preside at the hearing and at least five of the Subcommittee members are expected to attend. The Pembina River Flood Control Association has set up a pre-hearing meeting on August 4, 1970, at Cavalier and they have requested assistance from the State Water Commission to help prepare statements, etc., for the hearing.

> Commissioner Gray made a motion directing Secretary Hoisveen and his staff to cooperate in all ways possible with the Pembina River Flood Control Association in preparation for the hearing. Commissioner Dahl seconded and all members voted aye.

Secretary Hoisveen noted that Mr. Russell Dushinske would be working on a promotion for the hearing.

STATUS OF PROJECTS -Secretary Hoisveen gave a progress report on construction projects as follows: MT. CARMEL DAM A municipal and recreation dam being built (#1346) near Langdon storing approximately 4,300acre-feet. The city of Langdon will be in need of additional water supply due to construction in the area. Some problems due to soil base conditions have been encountered. Construction to be completed in about eight weeks. WHITE EARTH DAM A recreation dam near White Earth is 40 (#327) percent complete. Changes have been made in outlet structure. Construction to be completed in about six weeks. ERIE DAM A recreat on dam near Erie showing the (#1471) best progress of the season. Maximum height of 41 feet will provide excellent fish habitat. Estimated completion date is three weeks. SHEEP CREEK DAM A recreation dam undergoing major repairs. (#1358) Some problems with contractor schedule due to contractor's lack of equipment on the project. This has been improved by reminding the contractor of his obligations as set forth in the actual contract and contract bond. Estimated completion date is from four to five weeks. BURLINGTON DAM NO. 1 Secretary Hoisveen reported on the damages (#221) at Burlington Dam as a result of 1969 and 1970 floods. There were no major structural problems, but there were damages to the embankment caused by leaks which had developed as a result of burrowing animals. Repair work will be done by a force account crew with financial assistance from the Office of Emergency Preparedness and possibly the Bank of North Dakota. Secretary Hoisveen also read a letter from the Bank of North Dakota requesting technical assistance to stabilize river banks which had eroded along the Burlington project areas as a result of floods. Commissioner Jungroth moved that the State Water Commission assist the Bank of North Dakota in the investigation and design of the project needs to reduce bank erosion. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye. TOUR OF VERSIPPI DAM SITE The Commission members were conducted on (#647) a tour of the proposed Versippi Dam site and reservoir area near Dickinson by the local Citizens Committee, Bob Stranik, Chairman. The tour was comprised of at least 40 persons including the Stark County Commissioners, the Stark County Water Management District and the Dickinson City Officials in addition to those already mentioned. The tour was followed with an excellent luncheon and meeting at the

Congress Inn. The program, headed by Mr. Stranik, who made a presentation regarding the needs, etc., for a new water supply dam, also included remarks by Richard Gallagher, Vice Chairman of the State Water Commission; Milo W. Hoisveen, Chief Engineer and Secretary for the State Water Commission; and Raymond Schnell, Chairman of the Stark County Water Management District.

TOLLEY FLATS FLOOD CONDITIONS (#626)

Secretary Hoisveen referred to the meeting called by Governor William L. Guy on July 9, 1970, to work on a solution of the

drainage problems in the Tolley Flats area. The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers' plan was impossible due to the \$10,000,000 estimated cost. A plan to put in a principal canal only, provided by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, was likewise very costly at an estimated \$3,250,000. The Commission was then requested to study the problem and present a cost estimate for a workable plan and public meetings will be held in this regard to assist in developing a plan for drainage.

REQUEST TO APPROVE WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT FOR RANSOM COUNTY (#1529)	Secretary Hoisveen read a memo from Cliff Jochim, Special Assistant Attorney General, who had held a hearing on the Ransom County Board of Commissioners' petition to establish a water management district.
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Commissioner Hanson moved, as a result of the favorable report on the hearing, that the State Water Commission hereby establish the Ransom County Water Management District. Commissioner Jungroth seconded and all members voted aye.

REQUEST FOR APPROVAL AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO AID WATER QUALITY AT NECHE (#274)

Secretary Hoisveen read a resolution and request from the city of Neche regarding a quality water problem due to excessive flooding from the Pembina River and a plan to initiate a channel straightening program

with financial assistance from the State Water Commission. The city feels that they have a partial plan which they believe can perform for considerably less costs than the one suggested by the State Water Commission and they desire to try this plan on a temporary basis. The total estimated cost is \$20,000.

> Commissioner Jungroth moved that the State Water Commission participate in the project in an amount not to exceed 50 percent or \$10,000. Commissioner Gray seconded and all members voted aye.

DRAINAGE PROBLEM AT KNOX (#1531)

Commissioner Gray reported on a letter received from Olger Sandven, Secretary of the Benson County Water Management

District, explaining a meeting held at Knox regarding the health hazard and other problems resulting from high water table conditions in that city. Participants at the meeting included State agencies as well as local entities, churches and individuals. A recommendation by the State Health Department to drain waters to a nearby refuge owned by the State Game and Fish Department has been approved by the State Game and Fish Department. The Benson County Water Management District and the Benson County Highway Department will assist. Donations were promised by the churches and individuals. The estimated project cost is \$11,000.

Commissioner Gray moved, after a discussion regarding possible special assessments, to have the State Water Commission participate in the project by an amount not to exceed \$6,000. Commissioner Jungroth seconded and all members voted aye.

STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT LETTER IN RESPECT TO LOWERING OF DEVILS LAKE (#416) Secretary Hoisveen read a letter to Governor Guy from the State Highway Department, written by them as a result of a resolution they had received from the Devils Lake Region Sportsmens' Club requesting no

further lowering of Devils Lake by the placing of culvert sections through Highways 20 and 57. The letter stated that the State Highway Department would not place additional culverts for drainage unless the railroad would do the same and that this would be done only by order of the State Water Commission.

Action was deferred regarding the subject letter in that the Commission was advised that under present laws, they do not have the authority to order any further action.

CITY OF BELFIELD REQUEST FOR SNAGGING AND CLEARING PROJECT THROUGH CORPS OF ENGINEERS (#628) Secretary Hoisveen read a letter from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers which stated that they had initiated a reconnaissance investigation of a flood problem on the Heart River at Belfield. They indicated

that a snagging and clearing project may be appropriate. It was noted that a city of this size would need assistance in providing the proper project assurances that would be required. The State Water Commission would in turn obtain assurances from the city of Belfield.

> Commissioner Hanson moved that the State Water Commission act as sponsor for such project if the investigation results in a snagging and clearing project. Commissioner Gray seconded and all members voted aye.

REQUEST FROM TRAILL COUNTY FOR A DAM SURVEY NEAR MAYVILLE (#1530) A request from the Traill County Water Management District was read by Secretary Hoisveen for an investigation and survey of a recreational reservoir site five miles

east of Mayville and one mile south of State Highway No. 200. The request was accompanied by the required \$200 deposit.

Commissioner Gray moved that the State Water Commission enter into an agreement with the Traill County Water Management District for this investigation and survey. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye. WATER PERMIT NOS. 1703, 1709, 1710, 1711, 1712 and 1713

approved.

Commissioner Hanson moved to approve the six Conditional water permits as recommended by the State Engineer, subject to such conditions as indicated on the permit. Commissioner Gray seconded and all members voted aye. (See Appendix "A")

WEST BAY AREA LANDOWNERS INJUNCTION ON PUMPING WATERS INTO MAUVAIS COULEE DRAINAGE SYSTEM BY SWEETWATER-DRY AND CHAIN LAKES WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICTS (#416) Secretary Hoisveen read a resolution and a request from Neil Thompson, Ramsey County States Attorney, whereby the Districts are seeking to be relieved from the injunction and are seeking assistance by the State Water Commission for action to authorize further pumping of waters up to 100 cubic feet per second from the Mike's Lake area

Secretary Hoisveen presented six water

It was the recommendation of the State Engineer that these water permits be

permits to the Commission for consideration.

into the Mauvais Coulee drainage system. The request was supplemented by a capacity appraisal made on the Mauvais Coulee by the North Central Engineers on July 8, 1970, at which time they indicated that no flooding was occurring and that the Mauvais Coulee had ample capacity to provide for the proposed 100 cfs pumping. A check of U. S. Geological Survey records indicated that the flow on July 8, 1970 to be 180 cfs. In accordance with the determination made by the North Central Engineers, the channel could adequately provide capacity for 280 cfs.

The members of the State Water Commission agreed that the pumpage of 100 cfs should be allowed; however, should added flow in Mauvais Coulee occur through rainfall, the pumpage would be reduced to such a degree that the artificial induced flow would not increase the total flow above 280 cfs. A case in point, when the flow measured at Churchs Ferry gaging station is 300 cfs, the pumping from above by the Districts involved should be reduced by 20 cfs or whatever volume of water flowing in Mauvais Coulee exceeding 280 cfs and should be within the limits of the pumping, which is 100 cfs.

> Commissioner Jungroth moved that the Districts involved be allowed to pump up to 100 cubic feet per second of water from the Mike's Lake area to Mauvais Coulee drainage system in accordance with conditions specified. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:00 p.m., MDT, to review other water projects in the area.

Missouri River Bank Stabilization

WHEREAS, the United States Corps of Engineers has submitted to the North Dakota State Water Commission plans and specifications for bank stabilization on the left bank of the Missouri River downstream from the Memorial Bridge in the vicinity of Sections 5, 6, 7, 18 and 19, Township 138 North, Range 80 West, Burleigh County, North Dakota, and made formal requests for rights-of-way as contained in drawings numbered MG0C6-2E1.1 and MG0C6-2E2.1, March, 1969; and

WHEREAS, the North Dakota State Water Commission has approved and adopted said plans and specifications and has acquired from the City of Bismarck, North Dakota, the easements for the construction of the river-bank protection project as described above and set forth in drawings numbered MGOC6-2E1.1 and MGOC6-2E2.1, March, 1969.
