MINUTES

NORTH DAKOTA STATE WATER COMMISSION

Held at Chieftain Motor Lodge Carrington, North Dakota

July 7, 1971

The meeting was called to order by Governor-Chairman William L. Guy at 1:30 p.m. on July 7, 1971, at the Chieftain Motor Lodge Cafe in Carrington, North Dakota.

MINUTES OF JUNE 4, 1971 AND JUNE 14, 1971 MEETINGS APPROVED Commissioner Dahl moved that the reading of the minutes of the June 4 and June 14, 1971 meetings be dispensed with and that they be

approved as circulated. Commissioner Gray seconded and all members voted aye.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR MONTH OF JUNE, 1971

Secretary Hoisveen reported that there is no financial statement at this time due to the fact that a computer pileup has delayed the

report. The June, 1971 report will not be ready until August due to the workload at the computer center at the conclusion of the biennium. It looks, however, as if there will be some money to revert to the General Fund in all funds.

STARKWEATHER WATERSHED (#842)

Governor Guy reported on a meeting which he had held on July 1, 1971, regarding the Starkweather Watershed. He stated that at the time of the commencement of the watershed

project, there were 18,000 acres of wetlands in the area. The watershed sponsors agreed that they would provide mitigation for 75 percent of these wetlands. This means that the sponsors were to provide 13,500 acres. There now remains about 6,000 acres to be

provided.

Last winter a meeting was held at which time it was decided that lands which were purchased in fee would be counted at the rate of two acres of credit toward mitigation for every acre of land purchased. The sponsors felt that this was a relatively straight-forward agreement. It now appears that the United States Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife has managed to interpret this agreement in a legalistic manner and has changed its meaning. The result is that some recent tracts which the Fish and Wildlife Service have been trying to purchase are resulting in less than one for one credit towards the mitigation. The farmers and other local sponsors at the July 1, 1971 meeting offered to pick up an extra thousand acres of purchased wetlands if the agreement would be interpreted in the way they felt it was intended. It developed at the close of the meeting that the Fish and Wildlife Service representatives, Mr. James McBroom and Mr. Louis Garlick, felt that they had no power to make decisions at this time. Guy has, therefore, written a letter to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior asking that he immediately assign a negotiator with the power to act to meet with the sponsors and to develop a possibility that will work out so that this project can proceed.

PEMBINA CITY DAM (#299) The city dam at Pembina supplies a pool for the city water plant and it has some recreation and aesthetic benefits, being that it backs water

through the city park. It is located on the Pembina River. Last spring, this dam was damaged by the flood. No action has been taken to repair it previous to this time because of the request by the Governor for a disaster designation for this area. If this had been approved, it would have meant that OEP funds would have been available for repair. However, this designation has now been denied. The estimated costs of the repairs are \$3,600 and the city of Pembina has requested the State Water Commission to participate in the amount of 50 percent.

Commissioner Gray moved that the State Water Commission participate in the repair of Pembina City Dam in the amount of 50 percent of the costs, but not to exceed \$1,800. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye.

REPORT BY SECRETARY MILO W. HOISVEEN ON RECENT VISIT TO WASHINGTON, D.C.

Secretary Hoisveen reported that he had recently met with members of our Congressional Delegation and Congressional Committees in Washington, D. C. regarding quite a number of projects. He reported that he

had testified on an appropriation for a study to raise Dickinson Dam

This was at the request of Congressman Arthur Link and the city of Dickinson. He stated that this apparently has a very high benefit-cost ratio and the project had a good reception. He also testified on bills which would have given some protection from bank erosion on the Yellowstone River and on a bill to study the high water-table conditions at Buford-Trenton Irrigation project.

Secretary Hoisveen also reported that he met with Senator Quentin Burdick and Congressman Charles M. Teague of California on their attempts to get the authorization for the Section 205 Authority for flood control projects increased from \$1 million to \$3 million. The State Water Commission has already presented a resolution to the Public Works Committee on this subject. Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Public Works Committee felt that it might be possible to get such a bill through, however, it is opposed by the Office of Management and the Budget.

CONTRACT WITH THE NORTH
DAKOTA WATER USERS
ASSOCIATION FOR ASSISTANCE
IN COMMITTEE WORK

Secretary Hoisveen stated that we have been using the Executive Vice President of the North Dakota Water Users Association as an Advisor to the Commission and he has made a number of trips in setting up

meetings for advisory committees and he has made miscellaneous arrangements for various functions related to our state, federal and local water programs. He has also travelled to Washington, D. C. to assist in testifying and arranging for federal legislation. Secretary Hoisveen stated that it was felt that the Water Users Association should be reimbursed for the amount of time he has spent on these types of things.

Commissioner Dahl moved that the North Dakota Water Users Association be reimbursed for the Executive Vice President's services at the rate of \$50 per day up to a maximum of 15 days. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye.

DUES FOR WATER USERS ASSOCIATION

Commissioner Gray stated that the discussion of reimbursing the North Dakota Water Users Association for the Executive Vice President's

services rendered, raised a pointwhich he had been meaning to discuss for sometime. He stated that it was his opinion that the amount of dues which the State Water Commission was paying to the Water Users Association was insignificant when measured against the services rendered by that organization to the Commission. Commissioner Gray suggested that the Commission should consider increasing the payment it makes to the Water Users Association so that it will be somewhat more commensurate with the benefits received by the Commission.

Vice Chairman Gallagher stated that it was his opinion that it was obviously to the Commission's advantage to maintain a private sector in the field of water resources planning and development and that the Water Users Association was the vehicle in which the State Water Commission used to do this and \$5,000 or \$10,000 a year was an extremely cheap way to get such cooperation.

Governor Guy suggested that the State Water Commission pass a resolution outlining its reasons and that they then set the payment to the North Dakota Water Users Association somewhere in line what they feel would be equitable in light of the services rendered.

Commissioner Kramer stated that it was his opinion that \$5,000 was the minimum amount the Commission should be paying for the services it was receiving. He felt that the services rendered by the North Dakota Water Users Association had been invaluable to the Commission and the proper fulfillment of its mission.

Commissioner Gray moved that:

WHEREAS, there is a need to maintain a private sector organization to assist in planning the development of the water resources in North Dakota; and

WHEREAS, there is extreme public interest in the inter-relationship between the beneficial uses of water, such as wild waterfowl, irrigation, recreation, municipal and industrial use; and

WHEREAS, costs have increased due to inflation; and

WHEREAS, the North Dakota Water Users Association offers invaluable assistance in advice and education in the planning of water resources development and the planning and implementation of water resources policy; and

WHEREAS, the North Dakota Water Users Association have been expanding efforts in such areas as the organization of water management districts, the arrangement of public meetings, the organization of planning advisory boards, arranging educational tours to water resource

developments, and the organization of appearances before Congressional and Legislative Committees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the contribution to the North Dakota Water Users Association by the North Dakota State Water Commission be increased to \$5,000 per year effective July 1, 1971. It is the consensus of the State Water Commission that such a move is essential to maintain a viable private sector organization to assist in the education and development of water resources projects and policy in the State of North Dakota.

Commissioner Kramer seconded the motion and all members voted aye.

NATIONAL WATER RESOURCES ASSOCIATION STUDY

Secretary Hoisveen reported that the National Water Resources Association has decided to begin a study on national land use policy. They will analyze the

alternatives and develop the needed legislation to implement the recommendations of the Land Law Research Committee in such a way that the states will be satisfied with the legislation. He stated that the states are contributing to hire professional staff who will develop legislation for Senator Jackson's committee. This would mean that we would have a bill which is acceptable to the State Government.

Commission Hanson moved that the State Water Commission participate in such an effort by paying to the National Water Resources Association \$450 as its share towards the conduct of the study. Commissioner Dahl seconded and all members voted aye.

CLIMATOLOGY REPORT

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the State Water Commission has had a contract with the North Dakota State

University to prepare a new book on the climate and weather of North Dakota. He stated that the old book that we have been using has been less than satisfactory. It is now out of date and out of print. The new report has been prepared and has taken a different slant so that it is a valuable document. So far, we have spent \$2,000 under our contract with North Dakota State University to develop the data. North Dakota State University has made arrangements whereby 10,000 copies can be printed at a cost of \$2,300.

North Dakota State University does not have the money to print the book and if we are to make this valuable information available for public use, the contract would have to be extended by that amount.

Commissioner Kramer moved that the State Water Commission contract with the North Dakota State University for the preparation of 10,000 copies of the book on climate and weather at a cost of \$2,300. Commissioner Hanson seconded and all members voted aye.

SHEYENNE RIVER DIVERSION PROJECT (#599)

Secretary Hoisveen reported on the progress on getting the Sheyenne River Diversion project under contract this summer. He stated that Fargo has joined the Southeast

Cass County Water Management District and that there have been numerous meetings held. He stated that the project has been cleared with the Water Management District and now must have the clearance of the Drain Board. He said that the Drain Board's fears have been discussed at a hearing in Horace, North Dakota, and the city and Drain Board are to meet quite soon for the final approval of the Drain Board on a contract for the use of their drain to divert this water.

BALDHILL CREEK DAM (#300)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that petitions have been received from several counties requesting the State Water Commission to ask the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to

do a study of a dam on Baldhill Creek. Governor Guy asked what the relationship of this study was to Kindred Dam and it was stated that many of the proponents of this dam are opposed to Kindred Dam. This dam could be used, if it were feasible, to reduce the size of Kindred. It was noted that it is only a study which is requested and that the facts here are needed.

Commissioner Gray moved that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers be requested to study the feasibility of constructing a dam on Baldhill Creek. Commissioner Dahl seconded and all members voted aye.

BILLINGS COUNTY WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT (#1555)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that a meeting had been recently held in Billings County with the County Commissioners to discuss a water management district which Commissioner Hanson had arranged. We

have now received a petition from the County Commissioners requesting that the State Water Commission hold a hearing relative to establishing a water management district. Commissioner Hanson moved that the State Water Commission hold a hearing relative to establishing a water management district. Commissioner Kramer seconded and all members voted aye.

DRAINS (#1553, 1159 and 1552) Secretary Hoisveen recommended the approval of the drains as presented to the Commission.

Commissioner Gray moved that the State Water Commission participate in the following drains in the following manner:

Grand Forks County Drain No. 40 (SWC Project No. 1553)

The State Water Commission hereby approves its participation in the amount of 40 percent of qualified items, not to exceed \$20,376.62.

Pembina County Drain No. 51 (SWC Project No. 1159)

The State Water Commission participate in qualified items at the rate of 40 percent of qualified items in an amount not to exceed \$7,043.55.

Steele County Drain No. 3 (SWC Project No. 3)

The State Water Commission participate in qualified items at the rate of 40 percent of qualified items, in an amount not to exceed \$4,253.00.

Commissioner Gallagher seconded and all members voted aye.

WEST BAY LANDS EARLY ACQUISITION (#416)

Secretary Hoisveen presented a petition which had been requested relative to the acquisition of lands in West Bay. He stated that the landowners there are in

quite a quandary because they know their land will be acquired for the Garrison Diversion project; however, this may take quite a number of years. Therefore, they cannot sell it; there is no incentive to increase the efficiency of their operation at that point because they will soon loose it and yet they have not received reimbursement for their present holdings so that they can replace them.

Commissioner Dahl moved that Resolution No. 71-7-301, Acquisition of Graham's Island for Garrison Diversion Unit Project, be adopted. Commissioner Kramer seconded and all members voted aye. (See Appendix "A")

WATER PERMITS NOS. 1732, 1756, 1759, 1762, 1763, 1770, 1771, and 1774

Secretary Hoisveen presented eight water permits to the Commission for consideration. It was the recommendation of the State Engineer that these water permits be approved with the exception of water permit

No. 1763, Harold Brandt, Moorhead, Minnesota. He recommended that this permit be withheld at this time because an objection had been received.

It was moved by Commissioner Kramer, seconded by Commissioner Hanson and carried that the water permits presented by the State Engineer be approved with the exception of water permit No. 1763 to be withheld at this time. (See Appendix "B")

PIPELINE REQUEST BY MONTANA-DAKOTA UTILITIES COMPANY (#1373)

Secretary Hoisveen read a letter from Montana-Dakota Utilities Company asking for permission to replace a 12-inch pipeline with a 16-inch pipeline at several river crossings.

Commissioner Gallagher moved that the State Water Commission approve such crossing. Commissioner Gray seconded and all members voted aye.

CITIZENS' ADVISORY COMMITTEES

Governor Guy read a letter from Ralph Dewing, Director, Department of Accounts and Purchases, on the payment of the dues to the Citizens'

Advisory Committees which stated that it would be up to the State Water Commission if they receive any assistance from these Advisory Committees. Governor Guy requested that the staff be directed to prepare several budgets showing the costs of each of several meetings if held in Grand Forks, Fargo and Bismarck. He stated that the membership should be confined to one meeting and paid at the rate of something like 10 cents a mile plus per diem plus expenses.

Commissioner Hanson suggested that the State Water Commission ask Gordon Berg, Chairman, Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission Citizens' Advisory Committee, to

justify his request for such expense assistance and to request a specific amount. It was also suggested that the staff prepare a report on which Boards do and which Boards do not receive pay for its meetings. This was to be prepared for the next Commission meeting.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Secretary Hoisveen presented the Commissioners with a statement which had been made to the Constitutional Convention by Assistant Chief Engi-

neer, Alan Grindberg.

COMMISSIONERS'
REDISTRICTING

Secretary Hoisveen presented some maps suggesting Commissioners' districts. Governor Guy suggested that the State Water Commission

should not establish any regions that do not conform to the eight planning regions which have been created by Executive Order. He stated that he would be willing to look at a plan which uses these boundaries, but that he would not approve of any creation for regions which were different from those in the Governor's Executive Order.

AMENDMENT RELATIVE TO CHANNELIZATION (#1390)

Governor Guy read a statement which had been made by a staff member from the North Dakota State Game and Fish Department at a hearing held in Washington, D. C. on an

amendment which would have stopped all channelization by the Soil Conservation Service. There was considerable discussion regarding this amendment and the Governor stated that it was his opinion that such statements by state agency personnel should contain a very strong disclaimer of the idea that they are speaking for the state as a whole or that they are enunciating state policy. He stated that he felt that this statement did not contain a sufficient disclaimer and that it could be felt that this was an official state policy.

Commissioner Gallagher stated that he was somewhat dismayed to find a state employee making a statement, in the name of the state, which was contrary to a legislative directive concerning water policy.

LETTER OF APPRECIATION

Commissioner Gallagher moved that the Secretary of the State Water Commission write a letter of appreciation to the Kiwanis Club at Carrington, North Dakota, thanking them for the hospitality shown the Commission for the arrangements made for this meeting. He also suggested that the Secretary write a letter to the

Manager of the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District thanking them for their hospitality and thanking them for the chance to meet jointly and to participate in their groundbreaking. Commissioner Kramer seconded and all members voted aye.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at $3:45~\mathrm{p.m.}$

States Department of the Interior to seek Congressional authority
allowing it to acquire such lands at as early a data as possible.

Aldrich, Regional Director, United States Bureau of Reclamation, Billings, Montana; Theodore Mann, Projects Manager, United States Bureau of Reclamation, Bismarck, North Dakota; Honorable Spencer H. Smith, Acting Director, United States Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, Washington, D. C.; Senators Milton R. Young and Quentin N. Burdick; and Congressmen Mark Andrews and Arthur Link.
