#### MINUTES

North Dakota State Water Commission Held in the Trustees' Room, Elks Lodge Devils Lake, North Dakota

June 21, 1972

The North Dakota State Water Commission held its meeting on June 21, 1972, in the Trustees' Room of the Devils Lake, North Dakota, Elks Lodge. Governor-Chairman, William L. Guy, called the meeting to order at 1:15 p.m.

CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES OF APRIL 25, 1972, AND MAY 9, 1972 MEETINGS It was moved by Commissioner Hanson, seconded by Commissioner Dahl and carried, that the reading of the minutes of the April 25, 1972 and May 9, 1972 meetings

be dispensed with and that they be approved as circulated.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR MONTH OF MAY, 1972

Secretary Hoisveen explained the State Water Commission's financial statement for the month of May, 1972. He noted

the status of each of the accounts, stating that the Contract Fund, although only 28 percent expended at this point, is 100 percent committed.

It was moved by Commissioner Gray, seconded by Commissioner Jungroth and carried, that the State Water Commission's financial statement for the month of May, 1972, be accepted as presented. BUFFALO CREEK ROADWAY DAM (#1290) Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Commission has been requested to provide topographic mapping and financial assistance for the construction of the proposed Buffalo Creek Roadway Dam

in McLean County in cooperation with the State Highway Department, the State Game and Fish Department, the State Outdoor Recreation Agency, and McLean County. It is estimated that the cost of the dam, over and above the cost of the highway, will be \$105,000. The State Water Commission has been requested to contribute \$25,000. Secretary Hoisveen stated that, at this time, the State Water Commission's Contract Fund is obligated to the point where the Commission is unable to participate in this project until the next biennium. The Highway Department has offered to delay until next spring or such time as the Commission might be able to participate. Commissioner Gallagher suggested that the Commission establish a priority list of proposed projects for which it has been requested to provide funds.

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher, seconded by Commissioner Hanson and carried, that the sponsors of the Buffalo Creek Roadway Dam be notified that at the present time the State Water Commission does not have available funds with which to participate in the project, but will participate up to \$25,000 in the project either during the 1973-74 biennium or, should funds become available before the end of the present biennium.

U. S. BUREAU OF SPORT FISHERIES AND WILDLIFE WATER PERMITS Secretary Hoisveen informed the Commission that the U. S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife held water permits on the Wild Rice River in Sargent County and a tributary of Beaver Creek in Emmons

County, but was not making effective use of the water covered by the permits because the impoundments had washed out and were incapable of retaining any water.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Kramer and carried, that the State Water Commission notify the U. S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife that unless they take the necessary steps to utilize that amount of water to which their permits entitle them on or before July 1, 1973, the State Water Commission will initiate proceedings under Section 61-04-25, North Dakota Century Code, calling for cancellation of such permits.

TRAILL COUNTY RURAL WATER USERS GROUND-WATER STUDY (#1550) Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Commission has received a request from the Traill County Rural Water Users to participate in 50 percent of the cost of a ground-water study in Traill County for rural development purposes. He indicated that the total cost of the study is estimated to cost \$10,100, and that the State Water Commission has budgeted \$5,050 for it.

It was moved by Commissioner Gray, seconded by Commissioner Dahl and carried, that the State Water Commission participate in a ground-water study with the Traill County Rural Water Users up to \$5,050.

WEST RIVER DIVERSION BROCHURE (#1543) Governor Guy stated that he had received some complaints from environmentalist groups that a cartoon contained in a State Water Commission West River

Diversion Study brochure was in poor taste. Commissioner Jungroth indicated that he, too, had been contacted and that it was his feeling that the State Water Commission was picking a fight where none exists. The Governor also questioned the implication of the brochure's cover that the West River Diversion is the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow.

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher, seconded by Commissioner Hanson and carried, that the brochure be withdrawn from circulation and be reprinted using an objective, down-the-middle-ofthe-road approach.

MISSOURI RIVER BANK STABILIZATION (#576-1-H) Secretary Hoisveen told the Commission that Senator Quentin Burdick had introduced S. 3484, and Representative Arthur Link had introduced its companion

bill, H.R. 15293, both of which authorize the Corps of Engineers to construct bank stabilization structures in specific areas on the Missouri River between the Oahe Reservoir and Garrison Dam and which are in need of immediate attention. Both Senator Burdick and Representative Link have requested Secretary Hoisveen to testify at the bills' hearings in Washington, D. C. on June 28, 1972.

It was moved by Commission Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Gray and carried, that Secretary Hoisveen represent the State Water Commission and urge the passage of both bills at the June 28 hearings.

There then followed some discussion about the proposal to increase the Corps of Engineers's authority to act without prior congressional action from \$1 million to \$3 million. If the Corps were to be given this additional authority, it would benefit North Dakota communities such as Beulah and Hazen.

It was moved by Commissioner Kramer, seconded by Commissioner Gray and carried, that the State Water Commission adopt Resolution No. 72-6-323, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers Small Flood Control Projects, reaffirming its support of the proposal which would increase the Corps of Engineers's authorization to act without prior congressional action from \$1 million to \$3 million. (See Appendix "A")

LAKE ALICE WILDLIFE REFUGE PROPOSAL (#416)

The general atmosphere of the hearing held that morning on the U. S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife's proposal to establish a national wildlife

refuge on and adjacent to Lake Alice was discussed. It was the consensus of the Commission members that the proponents and opponents of the project are arriving at what is probably a compromise. Governor Guy stated that there is some urgency involved in that Messrs Elsperger and Magnuson have given the Bureau options on their land which expire on July 1, 1972. The Governor also indicated that he had a letter from the Bureau stating that they had acquired the necessary acreage for the Starkweather Watershed Project.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Hanson and carried, that the State Water Commission approve the U. S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife proposal to establish an 8,600-acre national wildlife refuge adjacent to and including Lake Alice in Ramsey County, North Dakota, on the condition that the Bureau recognize the need for comprehensive regional water resource and related land resource planning and development and accept the responsibility to work with all agencies involved at the national, state, and local level in the interest of total water management in order to minimize flood damage and to provide the maximum benefits from those water resources and related lands for the majority of our citizens.

CASS COUNTY DRAINAGE STUDY (#1063) Rick Jacobson, Director, Fargo Model Cities Agency, told the Commission that his Agency had sponsored a study of Cass County Drain Nos. 3, 10 and 40,

and is now in the process of discussing with various interested state and federal agencies the financing of improvements to such drains as outlined in the study. He then introduced Marshall W. Moore, Consulting Engineer, responsible for the study. Mr. Moore distributed copies of his study (see SWC File No. 1063, Cass County Drainage), and explained its more salient features. It was indicated that the Fargo Model Cities Agency is interested in not merely the city of Fargo, but the entire area. At this time the Agency is not making any specific request of the State Water Commission, but it appears that it will be asking the Commission to participate in the improvement of Cass County Drain Nos. 3, 10 and 40 in the amount of \$90,000.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Gray and carried, that the State Water Commission staff be directed to examine and evaluate the Comprehensive Drainage Study (Cass County Legal Drains 3-10-40) and to consult with the Fargo Model Cities Agency and Moore Engineering, Inc., with the understanding that at this time the Commission cannot financially participate in the improvement of such drains but it is the desire of the Commission to so participate at some future date.

REMOVAL OF TWO DAMS ON APPLE CREEK (#1551)

Secretary Hoisveen told the Commission that he had received a request from the Burleigh County Water Management District to pay 50 percent of the \$5000 cost of

removing two old federally constructed dams on Apple Creek which are washed out and inoperable. The request was discussed in detail and it was the consensus of the Commission that if the Commission were to financially participate in the removal of these dams, it would be establishing a precedent that could be very expensive in view of the fact that there are hundreds of such dams around the state.

WATER PERMITS

Secretary Hoisveen presented 16 water permits for the Commission's consideration

and recommended that all be approved.

It was moved by Commissioner Dahl, seconded by Commissioner Hanson and carried, that all 16 water permits be approved. (See Appendix "B")

There being no additional business for the Commission to consider, the meeting adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

WHEREAS, continually escalating construction costs have caused the current funding of such projects to be inadequate to meet present demands.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Dakota State Water Commission at its regular meeting in Devils Lake, North Dakota, this 21st day of June, 1972, that it does hereby endorse legislation and appropriations which will increase the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers authorities as follows:

Section 205 - from \$1,000,000 to at least \$3,000,000 Section 208 - from \$100,000 to at least \$250,000 Section 14 - from \$50,000 to at least \$250,000
