The North Dakota State Water Commission held its meeting in the Fred J. Fredrickson Memorial Library in the offices of the State Water Commission on October 5, 1972. Vice Chairman, Richard Gallagher, called the meeting to order at 9:40 a.m.

CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES OF AUGUST 24, 1972 MEETING

It was moved by Commissioner Hanson, seconded by Commissioner Kramer and carried, that the reading of the minutes of the August 24, 1972 meeting be dispensed with and be approved as circulated. FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR MONTH OF AUGUST, 1972

Matt Emerson, Assistant Secretary for the State Water Commission, presented the financial statement for the month

of August, 1972. He noted that the Commission has ordered two new vehicles through the Department of Accounts and Purchases, one being a sedan and the other a pickup for the Ground-Water Department. He commented on the various accounts.

After a brief discussion of the financial statement, it was moved by Commissioner Kramer, seconded by Commissioner Hanson and carried, that the Commission accept the financial statement for the month of August, 1972, as presented.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION REGARDING NATIONAL PROGRAM OF INSPECTION OF DAMS (#1579)

Secretary Hoisveen indicated that the State Water Commission has been named by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers to be the focal point for inspection of dams constructed by agencies other than the Corps of Engineers, the Soil Conser-

vation Service, the Bureau of Reclamation, etc. The bill, H.R. 15951, has been passed by both the Senate and the House and was signed into law on August 9, 1972 by the President. Any structure over 25 feet high or which impounds more than 50 acre-feet of water will require an inspection unless it has been recently inspected. He indicated that the State Water Commission does conduct an inspection of their dams during the flood period and the dams in the State are generally in good condition.

The Corps of Engineers is to be allocated \$90 million for this dam safety inspection, portions of which will be made available to the states. The cost of the inspection per dam is estimated at \$1,350.

PRESENTATION BY REPRESENTATIVES
OF THE NORTH AMERICAN COAL
CORPORATION AND MICHIGAN-WISCONSIN
PIPE LINE COMPANY REGARDING THE
MINING OF COAL AND GASIFICATION
PLANTS
(#1495)

Secretary Hoisveen noted that at the last Commission meeting, it was the desire of Commission members to invite representatives from the North American Coal Corporation and Michigan-Wisconsin Pipe Line Company to their next meeting to discuss future strip mining of lignite coal and gasification plants in North

Dakota. The following representatives were present: Virg Carmichael, North American Coal Corporation, Bismarck; Otes Bennett, Sr., North American Coal Corporation, Cleveland, Ohio; Noel F. Mermer, Albert E. Browning, John B. Cox and James P. Cencer, all representing Michigan-Wisconsin Pipe Line Company, Detroit, Michigan; and Ernest R. Fleck, Attorney at Law, Bismarck, representing the two firms.

Representatives of the two firms revealed that consideration was being given to construction of four plants of the lurge

type process for gasification of coal. The plants would each have a production capability of 250 million cubic feet per day and a coal consumptive rate of 80 million tons per plant annually. The plant life was presumed to be 25 years and the water requirements were projected at 15,000 acre-feet consumptive use annually. Additional water would be required for cooling purposes and this quantity of water would depend on the type of cooling facility.

The firm combine is investigating five different locations which are the Dodge-Halliday area, the Beulah area, south Beulah area, Center-Otter Creek area, and the Underwood area.

The leases now held by the coal company yield 17,000 tons of coal per acre and has a heating value of 7,000 BTU. (This compares to a heating value of 9,000 to 11,000 BTU in Montana and Wyoming coal.) In fielding some questions from Commission members, the two firms indicated that the rule of thumb for economic recovery of coal was based on the removal of an average of five feet of cover per foot of coal to depths of 150 feet and a maximum overburden for coal recovery was 10 feet per foot of coal and feasible mining could be accomplished to depths of 200 to 250 feet of overburden. They indicated that pollution through ground water and drainage was no problem in the areas where they held coal leases.

The North American Coal Corporation has initiated reclamation plans for levelling of spoil banks to a gently, rolling plain condition, a topography which presently exists in the mining area. To date, some 60 acres have been levelled and seeded to grass. Studies by the firm indicated that reclamation of lands cost approximately \$900 per acre.

Employment projections by the two firms and the American Gas Association indicate that approximately 300 employees would be required in the mining operations to supply coal for a single plant as is being proposed and an additional 300 employees would be needed for plant operation. It was pointed out that additional employees for the supporting sector, or secondary population effects are two and one-half times as many, or a single plant could conceivably stimulate a population increase of 1500.

On questioning by the Commission members, the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipe Line Company representative replied that the tentative time table called for plant production capability by 1980 and a four-year construction period is required.

Representatives of the two individual firms opined that the nation's energy supplies may well be much more critical than projections indicate. This is principally due to the recovery capability as reserves diminish.

A tour of the area presently being mined and lands reclaimed was tentatively scheduled for early spring. Mr. Virg Carmichael, the area representative for North American Coal Corporation, extended an invitation to guide Commission members on such a tour.

It was recommended by the Commission that photographs of land area reclaimed be taken by the State Water Commission photographer. It was the opinion of the Commission that such photos would be most useful for the legislature in revising present reclamation laws toward the best interests of the State of North Dakota. One of the problems expressed by the coal firm was following physically a definition and direction by law.

The Michigan-Wisconsin Pipe Line Company and the North American Coal Corporation representatives expressed their appreciation for appearing before the Commission during the early stages of planning efforts and indicated a desire to maintain close liaison with the Commission during development of the proposal to preclude any major problems and hopefully develop the best facility which would be acceptable to everyone.

REQUEST FOR A SHEYENNE RIVER CHANNEL CHANGE (#1344) Secretary Hoisveen stated that a request has been received from the Southeast Cass Water Management District for a proposed channel relocation in Section Cass County, because of an oxbow of g an access road used for farming

29, Township 139 North, Range 49 West, Cass County, because of an oxbow of the Sheyenne that is seriously damaging an access road used for farming purposes just east of the channel. Moore Engineering of West Fargo has submitted a revised plan and estimate for the channel change. Included in the new plan is a gated culvert to drain the old channel. It is estimated that the proposed channel change will cost \$15,232.60. The Southeast Cass Water Management District has requested state cost participation at 40 percent of the total cost, or an amount not to exceed \$6,093. It was the recommendation of Secretary Hoisveen that the Commission participate in the project, contingent upon the availability of funds.

Commissioner Hanson moved, seconded by Commissioner Kramer and carried, that the State Water Commission participate in the cost sharing for the proposed Sheyenne River Channel Change in an amount not to exceed \$6,093, or 40 percent of the total cost, contingent upon the availability of funds.

REQUEST FROM ATTORNEY
E.J. BOSCH, MINOT, RELATIVE
TO DRAINAGE PROBLEM IN
MOUNTRAIL COUNTY
(#1130)

Cliff Jochim, Special Assistant Attorney General for the State Water Commission, reported that Mr. Otto Engen, Berthold, had been involved in a drainage project over the past several years and he was totally unaware of the State law requiring

a permit to drain this land. Mr. Engen appeared before the County Judge and the County Court dismissed the charge. The lower landowners, at this time, do not intend to drop the matter until the drainage is restored to its original condition to prevent future damages from excessive runoff due to the drainage works.

Mr. E. J. Bosch of Minot representing the lower landowners, has requested the State Water Commission to institute proceedings for restoration of the drainage that Mr. Engen has done to date.

Mr. Jochim indicated that the Commission does not have the authority to order anybody to stop draining their land although this unlawful drainage is a criminal offense. He recommended that the Commission advise Mr. Bosch of this and if Mr. Engen's case was dismissed without prejudice, suggest that another complaint be signed, and that the Commission will assist the States Attorney in any way possible in prosecuting Mr. Engen, including engineering and legal services.

REQUEST FROM SOUTHEAST CASS WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT REGARDING ALTERATIONS IN ORIGINAL PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN SOUTHEAST CASS WATER DISTRICT WATER AND SEWER DISTRICT NO. 5 (#720)

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Commission had previously granted approval to the Southeast Cass Water Management District for their request to approve plans and specifications for the Southeast Cass Water and Sewer District No. 5, which dealt with a project along Highway #81 south of Fargo. Since that approval, a portion of the plans and specifications have been found economically unfeasible and

they are now requesting approval of these alterations.

It was moved by Commissioner Hanson, seconded by Commissioner Kramer and carried, that the Commission adopt Resolution No. 72-10-331, Approval of Alterations to Plans and Specifications for Improvements in Southeast Cass Water Management District Water and Sewer District No. 5. (See Appendix "A")

FUTURE COMMISSION MEETING

Secretary Hoisveen indicated that Bismarck will host the next meeting of the Missouri

River Basin Commission on October 18 and 19, 1972, at the Holiday Inn. Governor Guy will be honored by the Commission for his efforts in the establishment of the Commission. It was the consensus of the Commission members that a Commission meeting be held at that time.

Commissioner Gray moved, seconded by Commissioner Kramer and carried, that the State Water Commission hold a Commission meeting during the meeting of the Missouri River Basin Commission.

DIVERSION OF WATERS FROM THE YELLOWSTONE RIVER AND TRIBUTARIES FOR WYOMING COAL FIELD DEVELOPMENT Secretary Hoisveen stated that in view of the Governor not being in attendance, he felt that the Commission should defer their discussion of the diversion of Yellowstone River water for use in

Montana and Wyoming until a future Commission meeting.

WATER PERMITS

Secretary Hoisveen presented 10 water permits to the Commission members for

their consideration and approval. It was the recommendation of Secretary Hoisveen that approval be granted to all 10 permits subject to conditions stated on the permit.

It was moved by Commissioner Kramer, seconded by Commissioner Hanson and carried, that the Commission approve the 10 water permits as presented subject to conditions stated on the permit. (See Appendix 'B')

MISSOURI RIVER BANK STABILIZATION (#576)

Secretary Hoisveen read a telegram from Senator Quentin N. Burdick indicating that the Omnibus Rivers and Harbors Act had been passed by the Senate and was

now before the House of Representatives. The 205 Small Flood Control Authority was successful in the Senate and also to increase the funding authorization for snagging and clearing work and emergency roadside bank stabilization. This action was first initiated by the State Water Commission and is national in scope. This should place the Commission in a good position to obtain prompt consideration for such projects from the Corps of Engineers.

He also read a letter from Kenneth E. BeLieu, Acting Secretary of the Department of the Army, whereby that Department is objecting to the enactment of H.R. 15293, a bill authorizing construction of certain bank stabilization works on the Missouri River below Garrison Dam. They feel that the situation should be further studied and a report discussing these problems and alternative solutions should be considered by the Congress.

Secretary Hoisveen indicated that he and Vernon Fahy, Assistant Chief Engineer for the State Water Commission, had recently attended the Missouri River Main Stem meeting in Omaha. He feels there is a possibility of incorporating the states of South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana and North Dakota in a bank stabilization program in which the Senators and Representatives of the affected states could join to develop support for the program.

It was moved by Commissioner Hanson, seconded by Commissioner Gray and carried, that Secretary Hoisveen and the Assistant Chief Engineer obtain the opinions of these states at the coming Missouri River Basin Commission meeting for the incorporation of a bank stabilization program.

There being no further business to come before the Commission, the meeting was adjourned at 12:15 p.m.
