CONSIDERATION OF RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY THE JOINT ENERGY TASK FORCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE CONCERNING THE MICHIGAN-WISCONSIN PIPELINE COMPANY WATER PERMIT REQUEST

Governor Link indicated that he had received several requests for a statement to be presented prior to the Commission's consideration of this matter. He called upon Ron Swindler, representative of the United Plainsmen Association, who

At this time, Governor Link relinquished his chair to Vice Chairman Gallagher to present a motion and recommendations in regard to the pending application of the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company.

It was moved by Governor Link that the attached recommendations be adopted regarding the water permit application of the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company. (See Appendix "A" for conditions) The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kramer. Members voting aye on the motion were Governor Link, Commissioners Gallagher, Kramer, Noteboom and Just. Voting nay on the motion was Commissioner Jungroth, who stated that his vote reflected his doubt that mined lands could be restored to original levels of productivity.

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher that further action on water permits 1901C and 1901D be deferred at this time without loss to the applicant of its priority in time. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Just, and carried. (The intent of this motion is clarified by additional discussion recorded in these minutes.)

CONSIDERATION OF ESTABLISHING HEARING DATE FOR WATER PERMIT REQUEST BY MONTANA-DAKOTA UTILITIES COMPANY

Secretary Fahy noted that on October 11, 1973, an application was received from Montana-Dakota Utilities Company for storage of water on Brush Creek, South Coyote Creek and the Knife River to divert annually approximately 22,500 acre-feet of water. He indicated that the next step in processing the permit is to set a date for a public hearing and it was his suggestion that it be held during the Commission's regular meeting in March. If it was the Commission's wishes at this time, Secretary Fahy said he would set the final date for the meeting after considering all members' schedules.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF NEWLY CREATED MINED-LANDS RECLAMATION COMMITTEE

Governor Link announced the creation of a Mined-Lands Reclamation Committee to be composed of the following persons: Chairman, Dr. E. J. Englerth,

Reclamation Director, Public Service Commission; Dr. E. B. Norum, Chairman of Soils Department, North Dakota State University; Dr. J. F. Carter, Agronomy Department, North Dakota State University; Dr. Warren Whitman, Botany Department, North Dakota State University; Dr. E. A. Noble, State Geologist, University of North Dakota; Dr. Paul Kanowski, Institute for Ecological Studies, University of North Dakota; Dr. Jack Bond, Director of Northern Great Plains Research Center, Mandan; and, Allen L. Fisk, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service.

These individuals have been requested to serve on this Committee to develop comprehensive land reclamation guidelines. State agencies will be invited to submit input to this mined lands planning group. He noted that this Committee has a direct relationship with the action taken on the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company water permit application in carrying out the adopted recommendations.

Secretary Fahy indicated that a request has been received from Dome Pipeline Corporation for State Water Commission permission to cross North Dakota streams encountered in the construction, operation and maintenance of approximately 320 miles of dual pipeline extending from a point on the United States-Canada border near Sherwood to the southeast corner of the State. A hearing has already been held and permit granted

by the Public Service Commission. He noted that the State Water Commission's interest in this request is to assure that the stream crossings are constructed so as to avoid degradation of the stream and erosion of the banks. It was recommended by Secretary Fahy that the Commission approve this request.

After discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Kramer, and carried, that permission be granted to Dome Pipeline Corporation for their stream crossing request subject to inspection and supervision by the staff of the Water Commission to assure installation in accordance with sound engineering practices.

DEVILS LAKE BASIN PLANNING (#416)

Secretary Fahy stated that for sometime, the Commission has discussed the need for organized planning in the Devils Lake Basin. The Commission has been

provided copies of a listing of individuals who could be included on an advisory committee, and copies of a status report. Secretary Fahy said there is a deadline to meet on the current West River study and a final report is to be in the hands of legislators in January, 1975. Therefore, due to a lack of staff to handle both studies, priority will be placed at this time on the West River study and study efforts on the Devils Lake Basin will be deferred until a later date.

REQUEST FROM TRAILL COUNTY FOR STATE WATER COMMISSION PARTICIPATION FOR ADDITIONAL WORK DONE ON TRAILL COUNTY DRAIN NO. 13 (#1232)

Secretary Fahy stated that a request has been received from Traill County for State Water Commission participation in Drain No. 13. Earlier the Commission had granted participation in construction of a pipe drop up to 40 percent of the qualified costs. Extra costs, approved

qualified costs. Extra costs, approved by the Water Commission, were incurred for completion of the project, which amounted to an additional \$2,113.58. It was Secretary Fahy's recommendation that the Commission approve this request from Traill County in an amount not to exceed \$2,113.58.

It was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Kramer, and carried, that the State Water Commission participate in the additional costs incurred for completion of Traill County Drain No. 13 in an amount not to exceed \$2,113.58.

REQUEST FROM PEMBINA COUNTY FOR STATE WATER COMMISSION PARTICIPATION IN HYDRAULIC IMPROVEMENT OF DRAIN NO. 51 (#1159) Secretary Fahy stated that a request has been received from Pembina County for State Water Commission participation in the improvements made in Drain No. 51. These improvements were directed to be made by the State Water Commission

and it was Secretary Fahy's recommendation that the Commission participate in this request in an amount not to exceed \$2,974.48.

It was moved by Commissioner Kramer, seconded by Commissioner Gallagher, and carried, that the State Water Commission participate in an amount not to exceed \$2,974.48 for improvements made on Pembina County Drain No. 51.

CONSIDERATION RELATIVE TO DEVELOPMENT OF APPLE CREEK AREA - RESOLUTION NO. 74-2-357 (#1597)

Secretary Fahy read a proposed resolution which would encourage Congress to act favorably on S.B. 1896 and H.B. 10077 for the purpose of engaging in a feasibility study of the Apple Creek

Unit, Pick-Sloan Missouri River Basin Program in North Dakota.

After discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Noteboom, seconded by Commissioner Jungroth, and carried, that the State Water Commission adopt Resolution No. 74-2-357, Apple Creek Unit, Pick-Sloan Missouri River Basin Program, for the purpose of studying the feasibility of supplementing water supplies within the counties of Burleigh, Kidder and Emmons. (See Appendix "B")

CONSIDERATION OF CITY OF BISMARCK'S REQUEST FOR STATE WATER COMMISSION APPROVAL OF ANNEXATION OF SHOP PROPERTY (#682)

Secretary Fahy read a letter from the city of Bismarck advising that the city is in the process of annexing Eastdale Addition. The State Water Commission owns a portion of land located east of 26th Street and north of old Highway 10 that would be

encircled by the new annexation excepting a portion adjacent to the Soo Line Railroad tracks. The city is requesting annexation of our Shop property along with the surrounding area to avoid creation of an unannexed island.

Cliff Jochim, Director of State Water Commission Legal Division, stated that we are not subject to real estate taxes, but in the past the State Water Commission has agreed to make a donation in the amount of what the taxes would ordinarily be. It was Mr. Jochim's recommendation that the State Water Commission go along with the city's annexation request, provided that the majority of landowners in that area want annexation.

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher, seconded by Commissioner Kramer, and carried, that the State Water Commission sign and return the petition requesting annexation of the Shop property.

DISCUSSION OF NEED FOR GROUND-WATER MANAGEMENT PROGRAM REQUIRING METERING OF IRRIGATION AND INDUSTRIAL WELLS (#1389)

Secretary Fahy introduced Milton Lindvig, Director of the Hydrology Division for the State Water Commission, to report on individual development of irrigation in the State of North Dakota. Mr. Lindvig noted that ground water is the principal source of supply for In 1974, approximately 40 irrigation

most of the newly irrigated acreage. In 1974, approximately 40 irrigation wells are expected to be added to the 160 now in existence in the state. With this large-scale development of the state's aquifers, comprehensive management will be required to insure long-term dependability.

Records of water levels and the quantity of water pumped are data essential for the proper management of ground-water resources. Because pumpage records are so important, it is recommended that the State Water Commission establish a regulation requiring that all water pumped for irrigation, municipal and industrial purposes be metered. It is also recommended that this regulation be made retroactive to include all existing irrigation and industrial wells.

Metering of these wells will also be very beneficial to the user in providing valuable information. It will allow the user to periodically determine the efficiency of the well and pump, and from this he can determine the need for maintenance. He can also determine the exact amount of water being applied to his crops for more precise management; and proper management of the water resources will insure the long-term dependability of the water source.

It was the general consensus of the Commission members that immediate steps should be taken to adopt a rule and regulation whereby all ground-water applications which are presently pending and all those approved in the future will have an immediate requirement for metering, but the Commission should grant a one years' grace period to those existing ground-water permits to make arrangements for the installation of a metering device.

It was moved by Commissioner Kramer that the State Water Commission adopt a policy requiring a provision for the installation of metering devices in all pending and future ground-water applications, and that all existing ground-water permit holders be allowed a one years' grace period to conform to this provision. Commissioner Noteboom seconded the motion and all voted aye.

CONSIDERATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR MONTH OF DECEMBER, 1973

Matt Emerson, Assistant Secretary for the State Water Commission, presented the financial statement for the month of December, 1973. He briefly reviewed

the status of the Commission accounts.

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher, seconded by Commissioner Kramer, and carried, that the Commission approve the financial statement as presented for the month of December, 1973. RECONSIDERATION OF CONDITION NO. 6 TO MICHIGAN-WISCONSIN PIPELINE COMPANY WATER PERMIT APPLICATION

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher and seconded by Commissioner Kramer, that the State Water Commission reconsider condition No. 6 of the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company application, which was previously granted by the Commission.

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher, seconded by Commissioner Just, and carried, that condition No. 6 be amended and that the words "and by-products" be inserted. Condition No. 6 shall now be amended to read as follows: "The Company shall make available, subject to approval of the Federal Power Commission or any other appropriate federal agency, if such approval is necessary, to North Dakota distributors or users, such gas and by-products as may be requested for use entirely within the State of North Dakota. Such gas shall supplement, but not replace, gas supplies normally available to users or distributors in this state. In its compliance with this condition, the price for the gas and by-products reserved for use within this state, shall be at a wholesale well head or bus bar rate and not based on a so-called postage stamp rate."

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher and seconded by Commissioner Kramer that the entire set of conditions to the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company water permit application as amended be confirmed as passed. The vote on the motion carried five ayes and one nay.

The Commission recessed their morning session at 11:55 and the meeting was reconvened at 1:45 p.m. with Commissioner Gray present.

Commissioner Gallagher stated that earlier in the day, he had made a motion to defer action with respect to specific permits in regard to the application of Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company for the gasification plant. He clarified the intent of his motion by stating the Commission had granted 17,000 acre-feet to the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company and action on the balance of the permit for 51,000 acre-feet had been deferred at this time, which would include water permit Nos. 1901B, 1901C and 1901D.

He stated that consistent with the intent and spirit of the foregoing conditions, the State Engineer should be authorized and directed to prepare in such form each condition employing such language as may be required to embody the necessary legal and technical requirements as he deems necessary or adviseable, and submit same to this Commission for final approval.

CONSIDERATION OF WATER
PERMIT APPLICATION BY
UNITED POWER ASSOCIATIONCOOPERATIVE POWER ASSOCIATION

River in McLean County.

Secretary Fahy stated that a hearing has been held on an application filed by United Power Association-Cooperative Power Association to divert 15,000 acre-feet of water from the Missouri

Commissioner Gallagher asked if the Commission has received the environmental impact statement which was to be filed and Secretary Fahy replied the impact statement has been filed and is currently in the process of circulation among the state agencies.

It was the consensus of the Commission members that if the impact statement is still in the circulation process, the Commission would not be justified at this time in considering whether or not to grant the application, therefore, it was suggested that action be deferred until a later date until all the state agencies and private citizens have commented on the statement, and responses have been received from United Power Association to these comments. It was the Commission's desires to have this information at least 10 days prior to the Commission meeting in order that it may properly be reviewed before considering whether or not to grant the permit.

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher, seconded by Commissioner Jungroth, and carried, that the Commission defer action on the request by United Power Association-Cooperative Power Association, pending receipt of information and comments compiled by the State Clearinghouse on the environmental impact statement from the state and federal agencies, and private citizens; and also receipt of responses to such comments from United Power Association. Within 30 days of receipt of this information, the Commission will then place this water permit application request on their agenda for final consideration.

REQUEST FOR STATE WATER COMMISSION PARTICIPATION FOR SNAGGING AND CLEARING AT ANTELOPE CREEK (#1600) Delton Schulz stated that the State
Water Commission has received a request
from the city of Hebron and the
Morton County Water Management
District in regard to a flood
problem on Antelope Creek, which

runs along the southern perimeter of the city of Hebron. This creek hasn't been cleared and cleaned for years and is causing increased flood stage. Through a series of dikes and cleaning the channel from the upper reaches of the city to several miles below, this flood problem could be alleviated. The total cost of the work is estimated at \$18,000 and their request for State participation is 50 percent of the total, or \$9,000.

It was moved by Commissioner Gallagher, seconded by Commissioner Jungroth, and carried, that the State Water Commission participate in an amount not to exceed \$9,000 in the request from the city of Hebron and the Morton County Water Management District for snagging and clearing of Antelope Creek.

REQUEST TO RAISE WEIR AT DEVILS LAKE (#416) Secretary Fahy stated that a request had been received from the Devils Lake Chamber of Commerce and the Ramsey County Water Management

District for the State Water Commission to approve the mechanics for raising the outlet structure that controls the level on the west side of Highway 57 at Devils Lake. The level of the weir has been established by court order and the weir can be no lower than 1420 feet mean sea level, and with the dry year, the drop in water level, and the present amount of snowfall, the request is to raise the level three feet.

After considerable discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Jungroth, seconded by Commissioner Gallagher, and carried, that the State Water Commission grant the raise in the weir to the 1423-foot elevation as long as all landowners who would be affected thereby sign an easement or a release for said action, or it has been determined that they are not affected landowners and not owners of the property.

WATER PERMITS

Secretary Fahy presented 34 water permit requests to the Commission for consid-

eration. He indicated that five of the water permits, No. 1975, Norman Kvamme, Ruso; No. 1961, D. C. Willoughby, Ruso; No. 1958, Ralph N. Heinzen, Emmet; No. 1953, McLean County Land Company, Minot; and, No. 1911, H. D. Knudsen, Minot, are again on the agenda. They were all deferred earlier pending further investigations. He indicated that a pump test has been conducted in the area which has provided considerable data. It has been recommended by the Water Commission staff that these permits be granted provided that a special condition be attached that calls for the spacing of wells approved by the State Engineer and that approval be granted only after test hole logs, including static water levels and locations are submitted to the State Engineer. It was also Secretary Fahy's recommendation that water permit requests No. 1973, Gerald A. Ghylin, Regan; No. 2007, Milton Agnew, Menoken;

No. 2012, William Lambrecht, Lisbon; No. 2011, Myles Hoenhouse, Lisbon; and, No. 2016, Edward Salzsieder, Edgeley, be deferred at this time pending further investigations and receipt of information. He recommended approval of the other water permit requests presented to the Commission, and stated that all ground-water requests would be subject to and notified of the previous action by the Commission relative to the installation of a metering device.

It was moved by Commissioner Kramer, seconded by Commissioner Noteboom, and carried, that the Commission grant approval to the following water permit requests: No. 1983, John J. Wise, Golva; No. 1990, Richard Dietz, Sentinel Butte; No. 1991, Wachter Ranch, Bismarck; No. 1989, Norman R. Dahl, McHenry; No. 1984, JT Ranch, Bismarck; No. 1993, Wendell Paul Froebe, Bismarck; No. 1956, George Heinrich, Adrian; No. 1999, Norman Rockstad, Williston; No. 2001, Ronald Halvorson, McHenry; No. 2009, Roman T. Finneman, Golva; No. 1986, Tom Harney, White Earth; No. 1985, Eugene White, Dawson; No. 2010, Norman D. and Arlene Haak, Oakes; No. 2019, Robert J. Boyd, McKenzie; No. 2004, David Stokka, Cooperstown; No. 2013, Wayne Boeshans, Beulah; No. 2003, R. A. and Keith Salter, Menoken; No. 1998, Barton W. Cussons, Cooperstown; No. 1995, North Dakota Game and Fish Department (Indian Creek Dam); No. 2008, Bottineau Winter Park, Inc., Bottineau; No. 2005, Francis Ficenec, Milnor; No. 2014, Walter Benz, Dunn Center; No. 2020, Melvin Fetzer, Wishek; and, No. 1929, Robert Titus, Oakes. Water permit Nos. 1975, Norman Kvamme, Ruso; No. 1961, D. C. Willoughby, Ruso; No. 1958, Ralph N. Heinzen, Emmet; No. 1953, McLean County Land Company, Minot; and, No. 1911, H. D. Knudsen, Minot, are to be approved with the following stipulation attached to each permit: Any well location must be approved by the State Engineer prior to the construction of the irrigation well to assure proper spacing. Approval will be granted only after test hole logs, including static water levels and locations are submitted to the State Engineer. Water permit Nos. 1973, Gerald A. Ghylin, Regan; No. 2007, Milton Agnew, Menoken; No. 2012, William Lambrecht, Lisbon; No. 2011, Myles Hoenhouse, Lisbon; and, No. 2016, Edward Salzsieder, Edgeley, are to be deferred at this time pending further investigations and information. (See Appendix "C")

CONSIDERATION OF CONTRACT FUND COMMITMENTS FOR PROJECTS NOT COMPLETED (#1)

Matt Emerson read a memo which contained a proposed procedure for handling contract fund commitments for projects authorized but not completed. This procedure suggested that prior to sponsor would be contacted relative

the beginning of each calendar year, each sponsor would be contacted relative to the status of their project which has been authorized by Commission action for cooperative funding. The sponsors would be informed that the status review is not an attempt to have the project abandoned, but rather, a means of contract fund budgeting by the Commission. A questionnaire would be submitted to the sponsors and the Commission would take the response thereto into consideration in arriving at its decision relative to the status of the project's funds.

Commission members to proceed on the suggested basis in an attempt to either cancel, extend into the next biennium, or proceed with projects that have been incumbered, but not completed.

DISCUSSION OF STATUS OF AD HOC COMMITTEE ON WATER MARKETING (#1494)

Secretary Fahy reported on the status of the Ad Hoc Committee on the ownership of the waters marketing with respect to the ownership of the Missouri River main stem reservoirs, its disposition,

allocation and charges for the sale thereof. He stated that on December 13, 1973, Jack O. Horton, Assistant Secretary of the Interior, and Charles R. Ford, Office of Civil Functions, U. S. Department of the Army, wrote John Neuberger, Chairman of the Missouri River Basin Commission, and requested that he establish a regional Ad Hoc Committee to "examine the uses involving municipal and industrial water marketing from the six federal reservoirs on the Missouri River", and to in effect, provide answers and recommendations relating to the ownership of the water in the six main stem reservoirs on or before February 1, 1974. Mr. Neuberger then appointed the Committee and on January 4, 1974, it met in Omaha, Nebraska, with the Missouri River Basin states and presented the Federal Subcommittee Position Paper, which in effect said, the Secretarys of Army and Interior may jointly agree that a block of main stem reservoir water may be sold by contract to state agencies or to individual users. At the January 4 meeting, the Ad Hoc Committee requested the ten states to prepare and present a Joint State Response and Input to the Federal Position Paper on or before January 18, 1974.

On January 17, 1974, the states met in Denver and prepared a State Subcommittee Position Paper, which in effect stated, that the Federal Government does not have title to and control of all waters in the Basin. At this meeting, it was agreed that an extension of five months to July 1, 1974 would be requested. This extension has been approved.

On February 6, 1974, the legal counsel for the ten states met in Kansas City and formulated ten questions which

they feel must be answered. A conference call among the ten legal counsel has been arranged for February 27, at which time it will be decided who shall research and answer the ten questions and the time and place of the next meeting of counsel.

It was suggested by Commissioner Kramer and it was the consensus of the other Commission members, that the Commission meet on the following morning and have the staff layout some of the Commission policies that have been discussed at great detail in the past, but have never been reviewed, and perhaps a firm decision may be reached.

WEST RIVER DIVERSION STATUS (#1543)

Delton Schulz gave the status of the West River study noting that all the different schemes have been developed

for the individual river basin systems. Approximately, 12 different alternatives are developed for each individual river basin system. The planning staff are presently working on three different levels of development on the diversion scheme that are being proposed and also are developing costs. The first draft will be completed by January 1, 1975 and the final report by June 30, 1975.

SOURIS-RED-RAINY PLANNING MEETING (#305) Gene Krenz, Planning Director for the State Water Commission, reported on a recent meeting he attended of the Souris-Red-Rainy Standing Committee

to assess the direction that the Committee is going to take. He pointed out two objectives at the present to be accomplished by the Committee and one was to try and present the results of the Souris-Red-Rainy Basin Study to the public. Mr. Krenz was appointed as the Director of a Public Information Committee and his responsibility in this capacity is to prepare a public information program which will be submitted to the Upper Mississippi River Basin Commission in August, 1974. The other objective of the Committee is to respond to the comments which were received on the Souris-Red-Rainy report, which is to be chaired by Secretary Fahy.

Just that the newly appointed Reclamation Committee be asked to study the environmental impact statement now circulating through the state agencies on the water permit application filed by the United Power Association—Cooperative Power Association before the Commission meets to consider their final decision. Governor Link stated that he would contact the Committee and seek their review, but noted also, that their primary emphasis is to be concerned with the specific process in laying out the guidelines determined on scientific knowledge of soils analysis and certain vegetative adaptability and the process of handling the soils and overburden prior to the stripping operation.

It was moved by Commissioner Kramer, seconded by Commissioner Jungroth and carried, that the Commission recess their meeting for the day and reconvene at 9:30 on February 20, 1974, at the State Office Building, Fred J. Fredrickson Memorial Library.

The Commission reconvened their session

at 9:30 a.m. on February 20, 1974.

YELLOWSTONE RIVER BANK EROSION PROBLEMS (#1507) Delton Schulz reported that the Lower Yellowstone Irrigation District, in cooperation with the Bureau of Reclamation, and perhaps the Corps

of Engineers, has installed several spur dikes on the left bank directing the current to the right bank, causing extensive erosion in this area. The bank erosion is threatening 2,500 acres of irrigable land which has been developed within the Yellowstone Pumping Irrigation District, Cartwright Irrigation District, and Sioux Irrigation District. In addition, a county road, two farmsteads, two intake structures and several high capacity wells are in imminent danger. There are a number of additional acres in danger, including woodland, dryland farming, pasture and private irrigation acreage.

Construction of dikes has been stopped as a result of complaints. A meeting has been scheduled for February 28, 1974, with agencies and entities involved to try and resolve the situation. Represented at the meeting will be the State Water Commission, Bureau of Reclamation, Lower Yellowstone Irrigation District, Yellowstone Pumping Irrigation District, Cartwright Irrigation District, Sioux Irrigation District, and the Corps of Engineers.

MISSOURI RIVER
BANK STABILIZATION
(#576)

Secretary Fahy reported on legislation sponsored by Senator Burdick in the omnibus bill for water projects. It contains an item of approximately

\$25 million for bank stabilization works for several lakes and rivers in the United States, including the Missouri River. In a Conference Committee, it was determined that a 5 5/8 percent interest rate would be applied to new projects. The Executive branch now has the bill.

FLOOD FORECASTING (#1516)

Secretary Fahy reported on possible flood conditions in the Souris River Basin and Pembina River Basin. He

said that the Souris River Basin, partly in Canada, had up to three inches of water content in the snow cover. Vern Hendrickson, with the U.S. Weather Bureau in Fargo, is making forecasts.

WEST RIVER DIVERSION (#1543)

Delton Schulz reported on progress of the West River Study. At the request of Commission member, Myron

Just, a list of University of North Dakota lignite use studies were presented as follows:

- 1) A Survey of Water Cooling Methods in North Dakota
- 2) Water Useage in Lignite Coal Gasification Processes
- 3) The Effect of Electrical Plant Operation on Water Quality
- 4) Summary Report on Status of Other Sources of Energy

Also discussed was the possibility of establishing a conservation district in the West River area.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENTS (#1570)

Discussions were held regarding the State Clearinghouse, a part of the State Planning Agency, in their participation with and relationship

to state agencies in the matter of evaluating environmental impact statements. It was indicated that all agencies involved, should be required to comment on statements circulated for proposed projects. Commission members expressed their desire for these agency comments as an assist in determining the approval or disapproval of a water permit application.

Commissioner Just moved that Governor Link, as Chief Executive, analyze agencies involved in evaluating environmental impact statements and bring back to the State Water Commission his recommendations relative to the degree of involvement in review of the statements. Commissioner Gray seconded the motion and it carried.

Jack Neckels, State Planning Agency Director, discussed with Commission members the current procedures being followed by the State Clearinghouse for environmental impact reviews. He also discussed review policies and agency staff ability. Mr. Neckels cited the need for more expertise for his or some state agency in order to more completely analyze the impact statements.

DEVILS LAKE (#416)

Gordon Berg discussed with the Commission, the action taken earlier in the meeting regarding

a motion passed to allow the control weir at Devils Lake to be raised to elevation 1423 feet. Also discussed was the need for court action to settle the ownership question of certain meandered lands. It was pointed out at this time that a 1423-foot elevation would reduce the capacity of the present weir structure and if raised, the structure's capability should be re-evaluated.

It was moved by Commissioner Gray, seconded by Commissioner Just and carried, that the Commission adjourn the meeting at 12:15 P.M.

## CONDITIONS ON THE MICHIGAN-WISCONSIN PIPELINE COMPANY WATER PERMIT APPLICATION:

- Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company, hereinafter referred to as the Company, may divert a maximum of 17,000 acre-feet of water per year from Lake Sakakawea at diversion site No. 1 as described in water permit application 1901A filed with the State Water Commission on January 18, 1973.
- The water so diverted may be used for all necessary purposes in the
  production of synthetic gas including, but not limited to, process
  cooling requirements, process feedstock requirements, mining purposes,
  and all other uses necessary for gasification such as sanitation and
  boiler feed makeup.
- 3. The Company must use the most environmentally acceptable engineering and technological methods in the design of such coal gasification plant and any addition thereto, and every effort shall be made to minimize evaporation and other wasteful uses of water. Such methods and efforts shall be subject to approval of the State Water Commission. A decision of approval, disapproval, or modification shall be made as soon as practicable, but no later than six months after the Company has notified the State Engineer of such methods and efforts.
- 4. The Company shall prepare a comprehensive environmental statement and analysis concerning water appropriations for four gasification plants, incorporating therein a specific, detailed section on the impact of the proposed subject plant. The Company's comprehensive environmental statement and analysis shall follow criteria established by the State Water Commission in advance of preparation and shall be subject to periodic review and amendment by the State Water Commission during actual preparation. The Company shall file such report with the State Engineer along with any other environmental reports, analyses, amendments, supplements, or comments thereon which has been prepared by or for it concerning any or all of the gasification plants proposed by it in the State of North Dakota. The preparation of such a statement or analysis shall not prejudice possible requests for future specific statements or analyses pertaining to subsequent water appropriations by the Company.

The State Water Commission shall reserve the authority to modify or void this conditional water permit within six months after receipt of the comprehensive environmental statement and analyses should it appear to a majority of the Commission that the perfection of this permit in its current form would be "contrary to the public interest".

5. The Company shall comply in the design and operating procedures for its facilities with such orders as the State Water Commission shall promulgate, subject to the provisions of Chapter 28-32 of the North Dakota Century Code.

- 6. The Company shall make available, subject to approval of the Federal Power Commission or any other appropriate federal agency, if such approval is necessary, to North Dakota distributors or users, such gas and by-products as may be requested for use entirely within the State of North Dakota. Such gas shall supplement, but not replace, gas supplies normally available to users or distributors in this state. In its compliance with this condition, the price for the gas and by-products reserved for use within this state, shall be at a wholesale well head or bus bar rate and not based on a so-called postage stamp rate.
- 7. The Company shall consult and cooperate with and secure all necessary permits from all agencies of the State of North Dakota having an interest in the useage of water and the effects of the applicant's coal gasification facilities upon the environment, economy, and governmental units within the state.
- 8. The Company, through its president and other officers and consultants designated by its president, shall meet periodically with the Legislative Council Committee on Resources Development and the Governor's Task Force on Coal Gasification, or a joint meeting of the two committees, or any other appropriate committee, to provide information on plans and progress and to answer questions relating to the implementation of its coal gasification project or projects and related matters affecting water and the quality of life in North Dakota.
- 9. The Company and its coal developer associates shall be bound by all applicable state and federal legislation and state agency regulations and orders now existing or hereinafter enacted, adopted, or promulgated. Upon request, the Company shall report to the State Water Commission and other appropriate agencies with respect to compliance with such legislation and regulations.
- 10. The Company shall contract with its coal supplier within North Dakota to ensure that the mined or disturbed lands shall be returned to at least the level of agricultural productivity that existed prior to mining or disturbance. This requirement shall also apply to any lands directly mined or disturbed by the Company and its coal supplier. The Company shall supply water to the coal supplier at a reasonable cost in the event successful reclamation requires the application of supplemental water to aid plant growth on lands being reclaimed.
- 11. A perfected water permit shall be issued as subject unit is completed and only for that amount of water actually applied to a beneficial use, as is specified under North Dakota law.
- 12. The conditional water permit shall be granted for an initial period of eight years. If the applicant has not perfected subject permit within the eight-year period, it may apply to the State Water Commission to extend the time of the conditional water permit.

- 13. No assignment, transfer, or sale of any part of the water shall be made without prior State Water Commission written approval of all points of diversion, utilization, and discharge.
- 14. The Company shall provide metering devices, satisfactory to the Commission and available for inspection at all reasonable times by the Commission, to record actual amounts of water diverted under this permit.
- 15. Should the North Dakota Water Commission or the Legislative Assembly at any time, provide for the payment of a water user's fee, or any other fee or charge, the applicant shall be subject to such charges when they become effective.
- 16. The Company shall direct mining operations in accordance with recommendations of the State Water Commission with respect to the protection of existing ground-water supplies.
- 17. The Company shall agree to convey to the state all water supply and transmission facilities and such facilities' rights-of-way upon termination of plant operations.
- 18. Failure to comply with any North Dakota statute or any order or regulation of the State Water Commission may result in forfeiture of the perfected water permit in accordance with Chapter 28-32 of the North Dakota Century Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Dakota State Water Commission at its meeting held in Bismarck, North Dakota, on February 19 and 20, 1974, that it hereby encourages Congress to act favorably on the above mentioned bills to provide adequate funding to the Secretary, Department of the Interior, to engage in the feasibility study of the Apple Creek Unit, Pick-Sloan Missouri River Basin Program in North Dakota.
