MINUTES

North Dakota State Water Commission Bismarck, North Dakota

April 8, 2021

The North Dakota State Water Commission (SWC or Commission) held a meeting via telephone conference on April 8, 2021. Governor Burgum called the meeting to order at 1:02 p.m. A quorum was present.

STATE WATER COMMISSION MEMBERS PRESENT:

STATE WATER COMMISSION MEMBERS ABSENT:

CONSIDERATION OF AGENDA

The agenda for the April 8, 2021, SWC meeting was approved as presented.

CONSIDERATION OF DRAFT MEETING MINUTES

The draft minutes for the following minutes were reviewed and approved with no modifications:

- January 14, 2021, Subcommittee meeting
- February 11, 2021, Commission meeting
- March 11, 2021, Subcommittee meeting

It was moved by Commissioner Volk, seconded by Commissioner Anderson, and unanimously carried, that the minutes for the January 14 and March 11, 2021, Subcommittee meetings and February 11, 2021, Commission meeting be approved as presented.

SWC FINANCIAL REPORTS

The allocated program expenditures, financial reports, and supplemental financial spreadsheets were presented by Heide Delorme, Administrative Services Director (**APPENDIX A**). The oil

extraction tax deposits into the Resources Trust Fund (RTF) total \$249.9M through March 2021. The revised revenue for the 2019-21 biennium is \$305.3M, which is \$128M below the original projected revenue for the biennium.

Heide clarified that the current financial reports are through February 2021, and the memo presented to the Commission had the more recent financial information for March and April 2021, and that the unpaid approvals is \$305M which is the same as the projected revenue.

Heide stated that the Red River Valley Water Supply Project will request additional Legislative intent funding at the June 2021 Commission meeting, and it is not known if funds for the Mouse River Flood Protection Project will be requested. Engrossed House Bill 1020 provides an emergency clause which would release funds needed from the 2021-23 biennium if necessary.

STRATEGIC GOVERNANCE AND FINANCE STUDY (STUDY)

Jon Kelsch, Water Development Division Director, stated that the current contract for completion of the Study ends on April 30, 2021, and that additional scope of services may be added to the Study based on recent direction from the Governor's office. After discussion, it was agreed the completion date would be amended to June 30, 2021. The amendment to the contract would be sent to Commissioners for review and then finalized.

Brent Bogar, Consultant, AE2S, presented a brief update on the Study. Brent recently met with the Governor and his staff to ensure Study elements are captured and finalized correctly. Brent and his team are currently working through various funding and governance models and prioritizing different alternatives that will potentially impact the financing and governance of regional water projects. The proposed bonding bill that passed will impact the Resource Trust Fund forecast and funding from the Commission. Brent stated that additional comments and feedback from the Commission was welcome.

SOUTHWEST PIPELINE PROJECT (SWPP)

Sindhuja S.Pillai-Grinolds, Project Manager, SWPP, presented a request from Southwest Water Authority (SWA) to proceed with the sign-up campaign in Burt and Hebron service areas including Lake Tschida for the SWPP rural distribution expansion project.

Sindhuja explained that the SWA Board and SWC staff reviewed the information on the percentage of 911 addresses currently served by the SWPP for all the service areas and Burt service area has the lowest percentage of 911 addresses served. SWA Board is also aware of significant interest for SWPP water around Lake Tschida. Lake Tschida's south side cabins will be served from Burt service area and north side cabins will be served from Hebron service area. SWA Board's decision to move forward with a sign-up campaign was based on this information.

Sindhuja clarified that it is unknown at this time how many 911 addresses are primary residences, vacation homes, vacant properties. These factors will be determined after the sign-up campaign is complete. Sindhuja also clarified that feasibility criteria already established for SWPP includes a sign-up percentage required for rural distribution projects which is fifty percent, and can be adjusted based on specific needs of the service areas. The cost criterion included in the feasibility criteria is \$46,500 per equivalent service unit based on the current consumer price index. Costs for the expansion project were included in SWPP's request for 2021-23 biennium appropriation.

After discussion, the following motion was made:

It was moved by Commissioner Goehring and seconded by Commissioner Zimmerman the Commission concur with the SWA's plan to proceed with the sign-up campaign in Burt and Hebron service areas including Lake Tschida.

Commissioners Anderson, Hemmer, Johnson, Owan, Volk, Zimmerman, Goehring, and Governor Burgum voted aye. There were no nay votes. The motion carried.

COST-SHARE POLICY REVISIONS

Pat Fridgen, Planning and Education Division Director, requested further guidance on how to proceed and schedule further meetings related to the inventory of policy issues discussed at the March subcommittee meeting. The inventory was compiled over the last year in order to review potential changes to policy. Pat suggested further discussions be held after the final Governance and Finance Study is received in order to incorporate the recommendations into the cost-share policy. Governor Burgum concurred, however, after further discussion, it was determined that continued review and discussion would be held at scheduled subcommittee meetings related to issues such as fire flow capacity, infrastructure replacement, and extraordinary maintenance.

Governor Burgum also suggested that "Cost-Share Policy" changes related to cost-share participation be changed to "Project Financing Update." Cost-share participation is only one element for overall project funding based on the availability of low-cost, long-term interest rates available from fixed funding sources such as bonding and the Legacy Fund. This will allow the Commission to proceed with a wholistic approach to complete cost-share policy revisions related to financing and other related issues made available for the 2021-23 biennium.

PROJECT FUNDING SUMMARY

Jeffrey Mattern, Engineer Manager, presented a project purpose funding summary of overall appropriations available for April cost-share requests. John Paczkowski, Interim State Engineer, clarified that funds for the Drought Disaster Livestock Water Supply Project Assistance Program are from the general funds purpose funding. Proposed House Bill 1020 provides \$14M in general funds with an additional \$6M available for Commission discretionary spending allocation.

STATE COST-SHARE REQUESTS

FLOOD CONTROL AND GENERAL WATER PROJECT

Julie Prescott, Cost-Share Program Manager, presented the request for the Flood Control and General Water project.

DEVILS LAKE: FLOOD RISK MANAGEMENT LEVEE PROJECT - \$266,250 (SWC Project No. 0416-02)

Devils Lake requested cost-share for construction of a detention pond and stormwater lift station as part of the final phase of the Devils Lake Flood Risk Management Levee project. Devils Lake serves as the local sponsor of this project, which is managed by the US Army Corps of Engineers. The levee will protect homes and infrastructure from impacts associated with a 1 percent chance flood event. The project includes engineering and construction costs. Bid opening will be in March 2021 and construction is anticipated to be completed January 2022.

The total cost of the project is \$2,130,000. The US Army Corps of Engineers, through a cooperative agreement with Devils Lake, covers 75 percent of the costs in the amount of \$1,597,500 and Devils Lake is responsible for the remaining \$532,500. The request is for \$266,250, or 50 percent cost-share of the non-federal share as a flood control project. The project meets the requirements of the Commission's cost-share policy and the recommendation was to approve the request.

The following motion was made:

It was moved by Commissioner Goehring and seconded by Commissioner Hemmer the Commission approve the request from Devils Lake for \$266,250 at 50 percent of eligible costs. The approval is contingent on available funding.

Commissioners Anderson, Hemmer, Owan, Schneider, Volk, Zimmerman, Goehring, and Governor Burgum voted aye. Commissioner Johnson abstained. There were no nay votes. The motion carried.

WATER SUPPLY, RURAL WATER, AND FEDERAL MR&I PROJECTS: Jeffrey Mattern presented the requests for Water Supply, Rural Water, and Federal MR&I projects.

VALLEY CITY: DISTRICT 100 WATERMAIN IMPROVEMENT - \$305,100 (SWC Project No. 2050VAL)

Valley City requested cost-share for construction costs to replace six blocks of aging watermain. The project was previously approved by the Commission in February 2020. Valley City deobligated funds allocated to the project in September 2020 due to revenue shortfalls in the Resources Trust Fund. Valley City is now seeking approval of cost-share for the construction costs and will fund the local share of the project through assessments, local sales tax, and income from its infrastructure fund.

Project design is complete, and bids were received February 2021. Construction will begin spring 2021, with completion in October 2021. The total cost is \$508,436 with 60 percent cost-share of \$305,100. The project meets requirements of the Commission's cost-share policy for municipal water supply projects. The recommendation was to approve the cost-share request.

The following motion was made:

It was moved by Commissioner Goehring and seconded by Commissioner Owan the Commission approve the request from Valley City for state costshare participation at 60 percent of eligible costs not to exceed \$305,100. The approval is contingent on available funding for the 2019-2021 biennium.

Commissioners Anderson, Hemmer, Johnson, Owan, Schneider, Volk, Zimmerman, Goehring, and Governor Burgum voted aye. There were no nay votes. The motion carried.

WESTERN AREA WATER SUPPLY AUTHORITY (WAWSA): PHASE 6, 29-MILE RURAL DISTRIBUTION- \$595,100 (SWC Project No. 1973)

WAWSA requested additional cost-share for construction costs of the Phase 6 29-mile rural distribution project after receiving construction bids exceeding the previous estimate. The additional cost is due to increased labor rates under the federal Davis-Bacon Act, which applies to projects using Drinking Water State Revolving Loan funding. The expansion will serve approximately 130 new rural users in areas where water resources are limited, and generally poor quality.

Total eligible costs are \$10,694,780 with 75 percent cost-share of \$8,021,100. Previous costshare approvals of \$436,500 in June 2019 and \$6,989,500 in October 2020 leaves an additional cost-share of \$595,100 for the current request. Construction is expected to begin summer of 2021, with completion fall of 2022. The project meets requirements of the Commission's costshare policy for regional water supply projects. The recommendation was to approve the costshare request.

The following motion was made:

It was moved by Commissioner Goehring and seconded by Commissioner Zimmerman the Commission approve the request from WAWSA for state cost-share participation at 75 percent of eligible costs for an additional \$595,100, with total cost-share for all Phase 6 project costs not to exceed \$22,064,000. The approval is contingent on available funding for the 2019-2021 biennium.

Commissioners Anderson, Hemmer, Johnson, Schneider, Volk, Zimmerman, Goehring, and Governor Burgum voted aye. Commissioner Owan abstained. There were no nay votes. The motion carried.

EAST CENTRAL REGIONAL WATER DISTRICT (DISTRICT): SERVICE TO HATTON - \$75,000 (SWC Project No. 2050EAS)

The District requested cost-share for pre-construction costs including a feasibility study, design, and bidding to increase capacity to Hatton. The project will provide a long-term solution of capacity, consistent pressure, and the decommissioning of the water tower.

The District will complete the feasibility study, design, and bidding in early summer of 2021, begin construction late summer of 2021, with completion spring of 2022. The total eligible cost is \$1,366,000, with \$100,000 for pre-construction costs and 75 percent cost-share of \$75,000. The project meets requirements of the Commission's cost-share policy for rural water supply projects. The recommendation was to approve the cost-share request.

It was moved by Commissioner Johnson and seconded by Commissioner Goehring the Commission approve the request from the District for state cost-share participation at 75 percent of eligible costs, not to exceed \$75,000. The approval is contingent on available funding for the 2019-2021 biennium.

Commissioners Anderson, Hemmer, Johnson, Owan, Schneider, Volk, Zimmerman, Goehring, and Governor Burgum voted aye. There were no nay votes. The motion carried.

NORTHWEST AREA WATER SUPPLY (NAWS): FY2021 FEDERAL MR&I FUNDING (SWC Project No. 0237-03/0237-04)

SWC staff requested approval to allocate \$20.8M of federal Municipal, Rural, and Industrial Water Supply (MR&I) Program funding to the NAWS project. Funding included \$20.4M from FY2021 and reprograming of \$0.4M from other completed MR&I projects. Also requested was the reprograming of \$3M to the Souris Corner to Bottineau Segment (Contract 2-4C) from two completed NAWS segments and other completed MR&I projects.

The \$20.8 million is for construction of the Biota Water Treatment Facility Phase I (Contract 7-2A/4-1A). The biota plant was determined to be a 100 percent federal funding responsibility. The fluctuation in federal appropriations requires the state to cover shortfalls in the federal share to ensure continued construction progress. A Bank of North Dakota line of credit is available to cover federal shortfalls. Phase I has an estimated cost of \$64M. The currently approved Phase I MR&I funding is \$15.9M with the balance of \$48.1M to be covered by the state. The funding request reduces the state amount of \$20.8M to \$27.3M.

The request also includes reprogramming of \$3M for Contract 2-4AC. The reprogrammed funds include \$1.5M from the Glenburn to Renville Corner Segment (Contract 2-3C), \$1.1M from the Westhope and All Seasons System Segment (Contract 2-4A), and \$0.4M from other completed MR&I projects.

The total estimated construction cost of Contract 2-4C is \$4.6M, with project funding split between 65 percent federal share of \$3M, and 35 percent local share of \$1.6M, being paid by Minot. The request will also be considered by the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District at their April 15, 2021, meeting. The recommendation was to approve the additional federal funding and approve reprogrammed funding.

Jeffrey Mattern clarified that this recommendation was to actually approve the FY2021 federal funds for NAWS with the previous five-year plan amount of \$19M just for planning purposes. John Paczkowski also clarified that under the FY2021summary, \$20.8M up to \$36.7M was for the Biota Water Treatment Facility. John stated that a line of credit in the amount of \$50M was proposed for the 2021-23 biennium, and would be adequate if needed to cover any federal shortfall for the NAWS project.

Commissioners Hemmer and Owan stated that if additional federal funding was not received to complete the NAWS Biota Water Treatment Facility, the Commission would need to discuss with Minot the possibility they may have to share the cost and that the Commission would need to discuss how much of state funding would be used for each component of the NAWS project. John stated that a concurrent resolution will be sent to Congress requesting full 100 percent federal financing specifically for the cost of the Biota Water Treatment Facility. As it stands now, there will not be enough federal funding authorization to complete the overall NAWS project.

Governor Burgum requested that SWC staff provide regular updates to the Commission stating total available federal MR&I funding less the build-out costs.

The following motion was made:

It was moved by Commissioner Zimmerman and seconded by Commissioner Goehring the Commission approve the NAWS project for additional federal funding of \$20,800,000, with FY2021 funding of \$20,400,000; reprogrammed funds of \$400,000 for the Biota Water Treatment Plant funded at 100 percent; and approve reprograming of federal funding of \$3,000,000 to the Souris Corner to Bottineau Segment, with funding provided at 65 percent. This approval is contingent on available funding, that the project follows federal MR&I program requirements, and delegates to the Chief Engineer the ability to move funds between project elements to facilitate project completion.

Commissioners Anderson, Johnson, Owan, Schneider, Volk, Zimmerman, Goehring, and Governor Burgum voted aye. Commissioner Hemmer voted nay. The motion carried.

FOUR-YEAR PROGRESS REPORTS

Julie Prescott provided a summary of projects requesting funding extensions, projects completed with pending final reimbursement requests, and projects with turnback funds (**APPENDIX B**). Commissioner Hemmer requested a column be added to the summary stating the reason for the extension request.

There was no discussion related to the completed or turnback projects, and after discussion related to the extension requests, the following motion was made:

It was moved by Commissioner Hemmer and seconded by Commissioner Goehring the Commission approve the previously described agreements with Grafton, Barnes County Water Resource District, Park River Joint Water Resource District, and Maple River Water Resource District be extended based on the project sponsors continuing to make progress in 2021-2022.

Commissioners Anderson, Hemmer, Johnson, Owan, Schneider, Volk, Zimmerman, Goehring, and Governor Burgum voted aye. There were no nay votes. The motion carried.

DROUGHT DISASTER LIVESTOCK WATER SUPPLY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Pat Fridgen presented a current drought monitor map released on April 8, 2021, which indicated approximately 70 percent of the state in the "D3 Extreme Drought" intensity level. This is the latest indication that drought conditions seem to be worsening, and the potential for negative impacts to livestock producers is growing.

In 2017, the Water Commission reactivated the Drought Disaster Livestock Water Supply Assistance Program (Program) to provide financial assistance to livestock producers who were being negatively affected by drought. During that reactivation, livestock producers in counties impacted by "D3 Extreme Drought" intensity levels, and adjacent counties, were considered eligible for assistance. The Program is administered by the Commission and provides up to 50 percent cost-share assistance, not to exceed \$4,500 per project, with a limit of three projects per applicant.

The 2017 Program was ultimately deactivated by the Commission in December 2019, with project closeouts continuing well into 2020. After completion or closeout of approved projects, a balance of \$557,277 remains, which would be utilized for reactivation of the Program if necessary.

In an effort to be prepared should a drought disaster declaration be issued by the Governor, with a directive to reactivate the program, SWC staff are prepared to implement and manage the Program reactivation.

After discussion, the following motion was made:

It was moved by Commissioner Goehring and seconded by Commissioner Anderson the Commission reactivate the Program, contingent on a drought disaster declaration issued by the Governor of North Dakota; that producers in counties impacted by "D3 Extreme Drought" intensity levels, and adjacent counties, be eligible for assistance; and, the remaining \$557,277 from the 2017 Program be used to support a 2021 Program reactivation.

Commissioners Anderson, Hemmer, Johnson, Owan, Schneider, Volk, Zimmerman, Goehring, and Governor Burgum voted aye. There were no nay votes. The motion carried.

LEGISLATIVE/SESSION UPDATE

John Paczkowski provided a brief update on the proposed House Bill 1020, and Session highlights to date. House Bill 1020 will be voted through Senate Appropriations the week of April 12. Further adjustments to appropriation line items may be made. John will send updated material to Commissioners as it is finalized.

LEGAL UPDATE

Jennifer Verleger, General Counsel, Attorney General's Office, provided a brief update on current Commission and the Office of State Engineer litigation. There were no questions.

PROJECT UPDATES

SWC staff provided brief updates on the following projects:

OTHER DISCUSSION

Commissioner Johnson asked if it was the Commission's intent to draw down any carryover funding by returning de-obligated funds to project sponsors for them to utilize the funds for projects. John Paczkowski stated that Red River Valley Water Supply will request their Legislative intent funding at the June 2021 meeting, and representatives from the Mouse River project have not determined if they will request additional funding.

Governor Burgum requested SWC staff poll project sponsors that de-obligated funds due to revenue shortfalls to determine if they will be requesting funds at the June meeting. SWC staff were also asked to provide numbers indicating what can be allocated to shovel-ready projects at the June meeting relative to the priority list and funds we have available.

Commissioner Goehring requested SWC staff create precise terminology and definitions related to the cost-share policy and related programs implemented through the SWC. This will help alleviate confusion for constituents, Legislators, and the Commission.

There being no further business to come before the Commission, Governor Burgum adjourned the meeting at 3:42 p.m.

2019 – 2021 Resources Trust Fund

Oil extraction tax deposits total \$249,946,013 through March. The revised revenue forecast issued by OMB on March 16th is \$305,375,927 for the biennium. Based on that forecast, we are anticipating our future biennium monthly deposits to average \$13,857,479 a month for the rest of this biennium. Our February deposit was \$11,275,529 and the March deposit was \$12,364,082. Page 3 of your packet has a breakdown of our monthly deposits with the original projection of \$433,040,803 and our revised projection of \$305,375,927. OMB's revised revenue forecast for the 2021-23 biennium increased from \$254,755,563 to \$354,715,920. Legislative Council estimates revenue for this biennium to be \$307,440,000 and \$325,310,000 for the 2021-23 biennium. OMB uses the Moody's forecast and Legislative Council uses the forecast from Moody's and IHS.

Pages 4-5 of your packet have bar charts showing the deposits into the Resource Trust Fund month by month and cumulative to date. These are based on OMB's revised revenue forecast of \$305,375,927 and estimated deposits for April-June(July) of \$13,857,479.

Project Summary Reports

Page 6 of your report shows the Budget Summary. The first items in gray show our current cash balance as of February 28th and projected revenue for the remainder of the biennium. The light blue section shows projected expenditures. Our estimate right now for uncommitted funds for new projects is based on OM B's revised revenue projection of \$305,375,927 is \$72,187,000. This takes into account the unpaid approvals and remaining operating dollars needed. A cash summary detailing this amount is at the bottom of the project summary report.

Requests for this meeting total \$1,241,000, which is green. There are three remaining intent amounts that are listed below that. Red River Valley Water Supply has \$23,850,000 remaining in intent for this biennium. There is \$22,500,000 remaining in intent and appropriation for this biennium for Fargo Flood Control. House Bill 1431 includes \$435.5M funding for Fargo flood control which is the total for the project, so I did not include that amount in the remaining legislative intent total. Mouse River flood control has \$74,500,000 appropriated in House Bill 1431 for 2021-23. They have \$33,000,000 remaining in intent and appropriation this biennium. So the total balance of legislative intent this biennium that could be requested is \$56,850,000, which is in dark blue. The remaining projected balance after the remaining intent and approvals for this meeting would be \$14,096,000, which is in light purple.

Financial Updates Memo Page 2 March 24, 2021

Engrossed House Bill 1020 does have an emergency clause. If passed with this, funds for the 2021-23 biennium would be available prior to July 1, 2021.

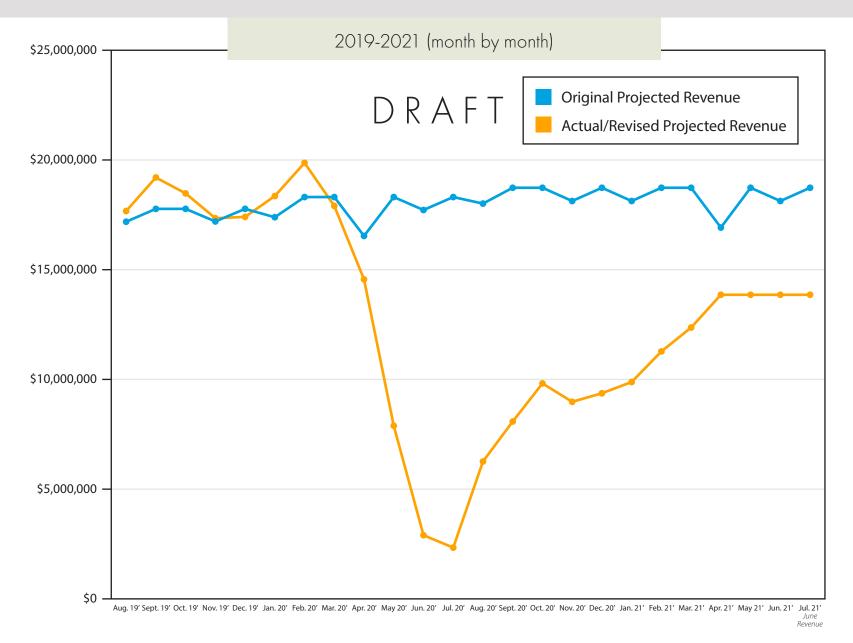
Pages 7-8 are the Project Summary spreadsheets detailing the committed and uncommitted funds from the Resource Trust Fund through February 28th. Page 6 has been modified to include a cash balance at the bottom showing the available funding for new projects of \$72,187,000. This is our cash plus estimated revenue, less unpaid approvals and salaries and operating expenses remaining. The Project Summary spreadsheets show approved projects totaling \$567,834,519 with expenditures of \$258,593,638. The balance of \$134,633,579 remains in appropriation for 2019-21 biennium based on the original revenue projection.

The spreadsheets detailing all projects are on pages 9-15 that detail the projects by each of the buckets. These are now split by carryover projects and new projects. The bottom of the reports show the remaining appropriation for each of the buckets based on our original projection.

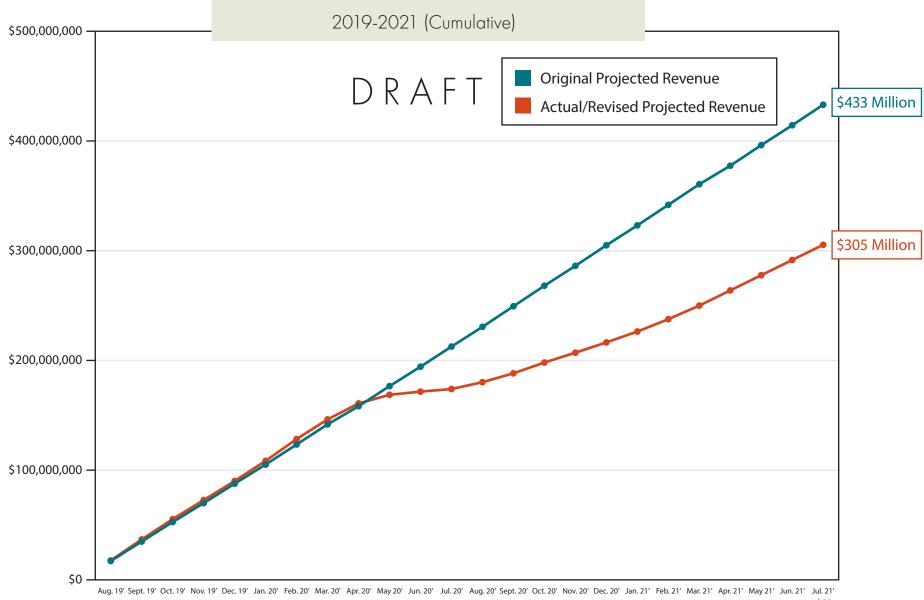
